County to receive another opioid settlement

SHEBOYGAN – The county will be receiving a settlement in another opioid class action lawsuit.

The County Board Tuesday voted to enter into a settlement agreement with McKinsey & Co. for the Chicago-based company's consultant work for various opioid producers.

"We don't know how much money we will receive yet," County Administrator Alayne

Krause told the board.

The county will be sharing in a \$207 million payment by McKinsey in a suit brought by 47 state attorneys general.

The county faced a Jan. 4 deadline to accept the settlement or withdraw from the action and seek its own settlement.

For that reason, the board acted on the resolution Tuesday rather than referring it to a second committee before final action at the next board meeting Jan. 16, after the settlement deadline date.

Krause reported that the coun-

ty has received \$847,000 in settlements from other opioid lawsuits, of which the county has already spent \$245,000.

The settlement money is segregated in a separate account for opioid treatment programs and positions to support those programs.

Sheboygan County Economic Development Corp. Board of Directors Chair Don Hammond updated the board on the group's efforts.

He said the group is focusing

its efforts in three areas – housing development, workforce recruitment and business development.

Hammond highlighted several housing efforts the SCEDC is supporting with its Forward Fund project.

Those include the Founders' Pointe affordable single-family home subdivision in Sheboygan Falls and a 120-unit apartment development in Elkhart Lake, among others.

The SCEDC has revitalized its Some Place Better worker recruitment efforts, including an improved website and more.

"There's tremendous momentum for talent recruitment and development," Hammond noted.

The corporation is working with several communities in their

industrial and business development efforts.

That includes aiding Cedar Grove in developing its industrial park, helping Sheboygan expand its industrial parks and helping Random Lake create a local development fund.

In other action, the board:

- Approved a new three-year contract with the Sheriff's Department employees' union and a revised wage scale for non-union county employees.

- Authorized purchase of a permanent radio relay tower site in the town of Sherman for the Sheriff's Department.

- Revised the county's sanitary regulations and shoreland ordinance.

Multiple deputies extinguish house fire before subduing man who started it

On Tuesday Dec. 19, at approximately 4:24 p.m., the Sheboygan County Emergency Dispatch Center received a 911 call about a disturbance in the N6100 block of Sunset Ave., in the Town of Sheboygan Falls.

The caller reported that their female neighbor had a protective order against a known male who was now inside of the home.

This male had physically attacked the female, was destroying property, threatened to burn down the home, and was engaging in self-harm.

The Town of Sheboygan Falls Fire Department, the Johnsonville Fire Department, the Town of Sheboygan Falls First Responders, and Orange Cross Ambulance were dispatched to the area. The City of Sheboygan Falls Fire Department responded later at the request of fire departments on scene.

Deputies were dispatched to the home. From outside of the residence the first Deputy on scene observed the man inside of the home dumping gasoline throughout the home.

The Deputy entered the home and the male lit a fire inside of the home, that was ultimately fueled by the gasoline.

The male was physically resistant to the Deputy's attempts to subdue and take him into custody.

A second Deputy arrived on scene and they were able to restrain the male as he continued to physically resist their efforts to control and remove him from the home.

By the time they were able to control the man, the fire had grown substantially.

Because the house was now filling with heavy smoke, the Deputies were forced to exit the residence as they were being overcome by the smoke.

As more Deputies arrived they retrieved and used numerous fire extinguishers in an attempt to put out the fire.

They were eventually able to re-enter the home and remove the male suspect from a bedroom.

The male was transported to a local hospital where he was treated and released.

He was transported to the Sheboygan County Detention Center where he is being held on potential charges of:

- Disorderly Conduct (Domestic Violence)
- Battery (Domestic Violence)
- Intimidation of a Victim
- Criminal Damage to Property
- 2nd Degree Reckless Endangering of Safety
- Arson

Two Deputies involved were taken to local hospitals for medical treatment.

The fire was completely extinguished by the fire department, but the home suffered substantial damage.

The female victim was located nearby with non-life threatening injuries. The Red Cross is assisting the victim.

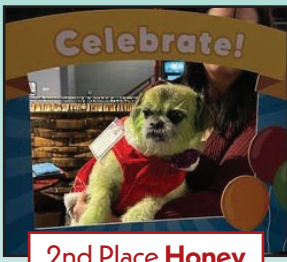

Word on the street - or in the storefront window, to be more precise - is there's going to be a wedding proposal soon.

Licorice Larry has already bought the ring for Candice - two mannequins decorated from neck to toe in candy - but nobody knows when he'll get down on one knee to pop the question at Studio 55 Family Hair and Nail Salon at 317 E. Mill Street in Plymouth.

"We're leaving that," owner Pam Polasky said. "We didn't do that part of the story yet. We're hoping someday."

"We love to decorate for Christmas, and I love these windows. I do my windows all the time. I love decorating. That was my second love, so this is fun for me."

Larry, and his dog, have been added to the front of Studio 55 this year.

Candice has been there six years, and the idea came about when Polasky was visiting San Francisco. She saw a little boutique that featured a candy dress, took a picture, sent it to a co-worker and said it will be going in the salon's storefront the next Christmas. Polasky eventually bought

a mannequin from Boston Store, which was about to close for good, found a dress at St. Vincent de Paul and ordered the candy online.

"(The design) was just in my mind," Polasky said. "I'm a hairdresser, so there's a little bit of artistic value there. We put her in the back room here and just worked on it. All those candies are hand-put on with hot glue."

Candice's mostly-green dress features Jelly Fruit Lime Slices, Candy Sticks, Starlight Hard Candies, and Spearmint Balls.

It took Polasky and Monica Entringer about seven weeks to put her together, and their reaction to the finished product was ...

"Oh my goodness, it's beautiful!" Polasky said. "People were absolutely floored and said that they have never seen anything around here like it, that it should be in a New York City window."

Studio 55 even had a contest back then to guess how much candy was used (1,556 pieces), and staff has to roll Candice in and out of storage with a dolly because she weighs about 230 pounds.

lasky couldn't find enough bulk black licorice.

However, Polasky was at her brother's surprise 60th birthday party this past September when she learned her out-of-town nephew works at American Licorice Company.

She purchased 15 pounds of black licorice and three pounds of green, got a mannequin from Amazon, a suit and shirt from Maggie's Closet, and a bow tie from Cain's Bridal.

There's also a Ring Pop in a box that Larry is holding for his eventual fiancée.

It took Polasky, Entringer, Denise Drews and Vicky Finlan about four weeks to finish.

"(People) do stop and do a double take," Polasky said. "Most of them go right to the girl. They can't even really tell that he is candy unless we tell them. I kind of bricklaid it on him so it almost looks like pinstripes. So many people take pictures, it's incredible. Or they come in and ask questions. It does quite a stir."

The stuffed dog, also bought off Amazon, is named Gumdrop because that is what he has around his leash. No other candy is on the pet, though.

Village considers 'best of both worlds' approach to mill pond

CASCADE – Village officials took the first step towards dam removal and a transformation of the mill pond at the December board meeting. A resolution passed authorizing Milwaukee Riverkeeper, a conservation non-profit, to investigate feasibility and pursue funding for a riparian ecological restoration project on behalf of the village.

The board chose one of several concepts presented by Riverkeeper and Stantec Engineering to officials and the public at a presentation in October and online. Listed as the fourth possibility among four options, the rough concept involves pulling out the dam to allow a stretch of Nichols Creek to meander through its floodplain in the northern sector of the village. A separate pond, hydrologically detached from the creek, is also part of the design.

President Tanya Powers said that there are a variety of opinions about the project and that trustees needed to be “in this together. I just want to make sure we don’t turn against each other if we get our backs pushed against the wall.” However survey data suggests that the general public supports the move.

Kevin Struck of UW Extension collected and analyzed questionnaire responses submitted in person and online. The form asked respondents to rank and comment on the four design options. More than 70% selected a dam removal option as their first choice with around half choosing option four. Struck said that he feels confident in the survey after taking several ‘snapshots’ showing consistent results.

Trustees agreed that outreach and engagement before taking this initial step had been thorough. “I think we’ve done a great job of giving everyone an opportunity to make a comment,” said Trustee Jim Larson.

Declining environmental and fish-habitat quality in the pond has been known to the village for several years at least. The basin has significantly silted in since last being dredged in the 1970’s, with elevated nutrient levels due to runoff. Canada geese are fouling the adjacent parkland.

The developing vision for the restored site includes numerous elements with human-use and environmental benefit. A free-flowing stream is expected to cause summer water temperatures to drop. Brown and brook trout could then move down from their source populations in the Nichols Creek State Wildlife Area and inhabit lower reaches. The detached pond could be stocked with warmwater fish like bass and bluegill.

Native perennial vegetation plantings could increase habitat connectivity for birds and pollinators. They would also help deter geese by giving cover to their predators. Walking trails and benches are among the other public recreation amenities being considered. Riverkeeper is aware of strong public opinion that the wooden Seabees footbridge should remain in the park.

“This will be a process yet, just so everyone understands,” said Me-

lissa Curran, environmental scientist with Stantec. She detailed a potential one-year funding phase and another year-and-a-half of design work before any groundbreaking would occur.

Riverkeeper volunteer Joe Shaffer then gazed into the future and anticipated completion phases of the project. “We’re going to really work with you,” he said.

“Once we figure out the engineering part, how can we make this a place people want to come to, picnic, walk [and] fish? We want to make it a really wonderful park that everyone can enjoy.”

Village officials and Riverkeeper shared a moment of mutual enthusiasm towards the end of the meeting. “You guys are awesome,” said Larson.

Wetland ruling upheld

The reversal of the DNR-issued wetland fill permit required for construction of the Kohler Company’s proposed golf course in Sheboygan has been upheld by the Wisconsin Court of Appeals, District III.

The court rejected Kohler’s arguments that a 2019 decision by an administrative law judge (ALJ) Mark Kaiser erred in considering impacts outside wetland boundaries. The decision affirmed the ALJ ruling that the DNR did not have sufficient information on adverse impacts to the environment before issuing the permit.

The court cited Wisconsin wetland permit statutes that “require the DNR to consider the entirety of a ‘proposed project’ when addressing a wetland individual permit.”

The court also affirmed the ALJ’s findings that key information was missing about the project’s environmental impacts, including:

- That “the nutrients and pesticides applied as part of the project would not result in significant adverse impacts to” wetland functional values.

- That “best management practices” proposed by Kohler to manage nutrients and pesticides would have avoided these impacts.

Friends of the Black River Forest, Inc. requested a review of the 2018 wetland permit.

Mary Faydash, FBRF President, said “Disrupting wetland systems has far reaching impacts on groundwater, water bodies, hydrology, and habitat. This decision will become valuable authority for future cases.”

Katte's story

■ North graduate, drafted by the Angels in 1995, overcomes suicide attempt after abuse by coach

Joel Katte wants to share his story.

The soon-to-be 47-year-old, who was drafted by the California Angels in 1995 as a senior at Sheboygan North, hasn't stopped playing baseball.

Katte almost stopped living years ago, though, because of an abusive coach. He not only overcame that incident, he's dealt with his father's suicide and is now a teacher and keynote speaker in Lexington, Ky.

"I never told the real, real story," he said. "I kind of needed to wait until my two daughters were a little older. ... I had never told people publicly about my attempted suicide and the bad situations with coach. But it is such an important message, because suicides do happen. ... I'm starting to put it out there."

One year after being picked in the 52nd round of the Major League Baseball draft, Katte was in extended spring training in Arizona and says the culmination of everything his youth coach had done the previous four years finally got the best of him.

"Here I am living my dream, and it should be everything I had wanted," Katte said. "I didn't even feel like myself and the pain was too much."

So on an off day, Katte got a "big bottle" of Advil pills and swallowed them with chocolate milk. He went to his practice field, rolled out a pitching machine, and ...

"I was going to hit until I died," Katte said.

A police officer happened to pull into the parking lot, and Katte explained he was one of the players who was just doing some thinking. The officer

said something told him to give Katte a ride home, even though he's not supposed to.

"Nothing really magical or wonderful happened as far as interacting with him during the 5-minute drive," Katte said. "I just had two images, of my future family and me someday teaching. That was kind of my back-up plan if I didn't become a baseball player. Those images were strong and powerful enough to where I was like, 'yeah, I need to hang on.'"

The Angels found out what had happened, however, and

pulled Katte aside.

"They said, 'look, we care about you, you're putting up good numbers and performing, but you've got to see a counselor. This is not okay,'" Katte said.

The abuse continued, how-

ever, because the youth coach convinced Katte not to see a counselor and he was eventually released by the Angels.

Katte says it wasn't until he was 24 that he was able to "break away" from the abusive situation.

He eventually got a job at Sheboygan South as an English teacher and freshmen baseball coach, and also got married.

But in 2009, Katte's father committed suicide. He remembers seeing a grief counselor, who told him there is no right or wrong way to process the loss.

"Just don't do anything crazy like quit your job and move," Katte said. "And I was like, 'that sounds fantastic.'"

So Katte and his family moved to Kentucky, where he continued to play baseball in adult leagues.

Katte even went to Florida the last two springs and made the BlackSox barnstorming team that played preseason games against independent minor-league squads, including the Lexington Counter Clocks, managed by former Major League Baseball player Barry Lyons.

Lyons was so impressed with Katte, he invited him to come to the Counter Clocks camp this spring.

"I'm pretty proud of that," Katte said. "It's a higher level of baseball than where I was playing when I was 19, because these are former major leaguers, Triple-A and Double-A players."

No matter how well Katte does, it'll just add to his story.

"It's been a crazy, difficult thing to live, let alone tell the story," he said. "But my motive is, it is a journey. I've always wanted people to not have to go through what I went through. It goes beyond sports. How do people feel so entitled and empowered to control people, and do these terrible things, and why is it so difficult for people to get away? ... 'That's part of the work I do as an educator and a speaker, so that I can continue to get stronger and help other people learn from it. We have to hold people accountable who should be held accountable, so we can save other people from situations like these.'"

Sheboygan's Randy Markwardt will join an esteemed list of standouts enshrined on the Plymouth Racing Wall of Fame as part of the Class of 2024 induction ceremony July 13.

Markwardt, who began his career in 1977, won the EWSC Sportsman title at Plymouth in 1993 and captured an EWSC Limited Late Model crown in 1999.

A fan favorite throughout his lengthy racing career, Markwardt placed sixth in the Late Model Division in 2017.

To promote his Markwardt Sales & Service family business, he carried a Mighty Mouse with wheels holding a wrench logo on some of his race cars.

The induction ceremony will be held Saturday, July 13, at the track. The names of each inductee will be permanently etched on the Wall of Fame, located underneath the grandstand at the racing facility.

The Class of '24, which includes Dave Haag, Steve Hoffmann and KJ Skelton. Haag and Hoffmann are from Plymouth, and Skelton is a Cascade native.

After Jerry forged the way for the McMullen family as a competitor in the early days of racing in Plymouth, Tim was a top competitor in the EWSC Winged Super Modified division from 1993 through the mid-2000s.

In recent years, Tim's son,

Brandon, has been a force in the PDTR 360 Sprint Car division, earning three track titles in 2017, 2020 and 2023, while claiming a division record 33 PDTR 360 Sprint Car A-main victories.

The Wall of Fame includes the

following eight drivers:

Dave Haag - He opened his career in the EWSC Hobby Stock division in 1980. After finishing second in 1982, Haag was crowned as the Hobby Stock track champion at Plymouth in 1983. He went on to compete for a number of years in the EWSC Sportsman division.

Steve Hoffmann - He began racing in Plymouth in 1981 before

capturing three straight Eastern Wisconsin Stock Car Limited Late Model championships in 1996, 1997 and 1998. Hoffmann's three straight track titles ties him with Gary Laack and Donny Goeden for the third-most consecutive championships in track history.

KJ Skelton - This driver began his career in the EWSC Winged Super Modified division as a teenager in 1987. His hard charging nature netted him runner-up showings in the highly competitive Winged Super Modified division at the track in 1991, 1992 and 1993. Steve Schad - Racing out of Cleveland, he placed second in the EWSC Hobby Stock division in 1983 and then won back-to-back titles at Plymouth in 1984 and 1985.

The three others are Fuzzy Fassbender, Donny Goeden and Pete Ostrowski.

Inductees in the Dedication to Racing category include longtime flagman Bill Krueger, who also served as a pit crew member and car sponsor, along with workers Lee Glomski and John Laack.

Year in review: Here's looking at you, 2023

Beacon highlights from the past year are broken down month by month:

JANUARY

Golf 365 opens in Sheboygan, giving people a chance to play an entire round at over 150 courses around the world. It's located where Game On used to be (2729 Indiana Avenue).

North's **Bennett Waara** is one of 18 high school seniors in Wisconsin that have been awarded the Western Golf Association's Chick Evans Scholarship. It is a full four-year housing and tuition scholarship for caddies based on their work on the course, excellent academics, demonstrated financial need and outstanding character.

FEBRUARY

Since 1979, South's school record in the 50-yard freestyle had stood. On the 11, senior **Aidan Crimmins** broke it thanks to his time of 22.29 seconds at sectionals.

The girls state wrestling tournament was held at the Kohl Center in Madison for the first time, and three from Sheboygan competed: South's **Ariya Yang** and **Elliana Robinson**, and North's **Destiny Duesterbeck**.

The **Golden Raiders' dance team** (below) came in first in the Division 1 hip hop category at the WACPC State Dance Championship at the La Crosse Center.



MARCH

North's **Anna Fogle** (above) was named to the WBCA's Division 1 all-state honorable mention team and became just the third girl at her school to score 1,000 points.

Lutheran's **Addy Verhagen** recovered from a shoulder injury to make the WBCA all-State Division 4 honorable mention team. The sophomore also earned first-team all Big-East Conference for the second straight time.

Max Tutas finished as North's eighth-leading scorer in the history of the boys basketball program and surpassed the 1,000 point total despite playing in only 10 games during the pandemic season. No wonder he made all-conference for the second year in a row.

North's **Juliana Bergman** won a Wisconsin High School Bowling Club State Championship. Last season, Bergman did not advance out of the first round at state.

APRIL

Freshman **Keeran Blattner** scored three goals in her first game on the Lutheran/Christian varsity soccer team. Afterward, her family rewarded her with a cookie dough concrete mixer with caramel drizzle from Culver's.

MAY

David Rautmann (right) is selected the Wisconsin Health and Physical Education Elementary Teacher of the Year. Rautmann, in his ninth year at Jefferson Elementary School, graduated from South in 1995.



Thanks to what football coach Joe O'Brien calls an incredibly awesome and supportive administration at North, the Golden Raiders will have a **new field and scoreboard** next season. New sod was put down and the scoreboard was replaced in summer.

JUNE

North picked up its third **state title in golf** and first since 1992 (the other was '86). The Golden Raiders, who took fourth last year, finished eight strokes ahead of runner-up Eau Claire Memorial. Senior **Maxon Schmidtke** tied for third.

Lutheran's golf team, at the WIAA state meet for the fifth time, matched their best performance by taking third in the Division 3 championship.

Tim Eirich thinks he's been coaching girls soccer at North for 22 years, and for the first time during his tenure, a Golden Raider was selected conference player of the year: senior **Abby Reinl**, who was

tabbed co-player of the year in the Fox River Classic Conference. Reinl scored 32 goals, nine more than anyone else in the league.

Lutheran senior **John Cole** set a school record with a time of 22.93 seconds in the 200-meter dash while competing in the track and field state championship meet.

JULY

Abby Reinl's mother came home the other day and showed her a piece of paper. "I was confused because I didn't know what it was," Reinl said. It was the Wisconsin Soccer Coaches Association's all-state list, and the North senior made the first team.

Sheboygan's Under-17 **Legion Baseball Team** competed in the state tournament. The squad, which has five players from North and three from South, also made state last season.

Sheboygan A's pitcher **Brad Rindfleisch** broke Tom Eckhardt's single-season strikeout record set in 1990.

Nash Banko (below), who lives in Sheboygan and attends Oostburg, finished in seventh place at the US Marine Corps USAW 16U National Wrestling Championships in the Freestyle division in Fargo, N.D. He is now an All-American thanks to his results at 160 pounds.



AUGUST

For the first time since 2012, **South's football team** (above) won its opening game of the season. New coach Mike Rank and the Redwings defeated visiting West Bend West, 7-0, in Week 1 to snap a two-year skid of starting the year 0-4.

Christian has a cross country program for the first time since the mid-1980s.

SEPTEMBER

Jason Klug is the new athletic director at Christian High School.

OCTOBER

North had 11 players selected to the all-Fox River Classic Conference South Division football team, which advanced to the playoffs in consecutive seasons for the first time in school history. Senior offensive lineman **Ben Karle** earned first-team honors for the second year in a row.

In addition to the health and wellness and safety features, Centennial Lodge will allow for year-round programming and program development opportunities at Camp Anokijig.

The new lodge will include winterized indoor space to

serve youth and families from November through March, as well as provide additional indoor programming space during rainy summer days.

In response to on-going demand, Centennial Lodge will include event space able to accommodate gatherings, corporate and community events, parties and celebrations, and much more.

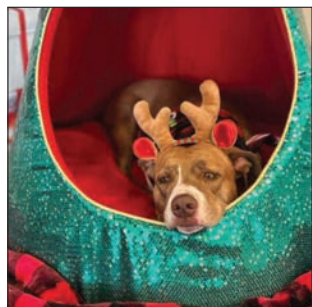
The construction of Centennial Lodge is a critical component of Camp Anokijig's Bridge to the Future fundraising campaign.

Film series covers wide project range

The Belladonna Film Project, which hosts Filmmaker Thursdays at the Sheboygan Visual Artists Gallery, is putting on Sips & Cinema next month in Plymouth.

The event, Jan. 26-27 at the Plymouth Arts Center, is a short film program paired with a wine tasting. It features a selection of five short films paired with five pours of wine.

Tickets are \$45 per person and can be purchased at the Arts Center or on its website (plymoutharts.org).

Beah Travis, who graduated from Plymouth in 2009, created Belladonna Film Project.

It's a company that produces regional independent film projects and provides accessible arts experiences for Midwest communities.

Filmmaker Thursdays, held

the third Thursday every month, is open to any filmmaker, photographer, writer, actor, creative, or film enthusiast interested in talking film and exploring filmmaking.

"I was working in New York in the film industry and I set out to write my own feature screen play that I wanted to set back in my hometown," Travis said. "And the name of that film was Belladonna. Along the journey of writing a feature film, I started making other short films and also networking with different artists and filmmakers in the Sheboygan area, and different community organizations.

"So sort of enough like smaller projects started popping up that it became apparent an umbrella organization was needed to support all these different projects that we were doing. And so we launched Belladonna Film Project a year ago."

Travis, who attended the University of Wisconsin and lives in Chicago (after stops in New York City and Boulder, Colo.), started making films in middle school and continued to do so in high school.

"There wasn't a program to

support that in the area, so for me, it was just about getting my friends and cousins together and convincing them to make a film with me," she said. "So I think in a lot of ways it felt really natural to come back to the area and see who else was hoping for that outlet in the area, and to make that happen here. That's why I was inspired to write a feature film that was based here and start and organization in this year.

"I think it's really exciting and neat and interesting to be doing film in communities where it's not as prevalent, and where's there's excitement about having that outlet to be able to be involved in the arts and to be involved in film, to tell stories that are from the Midwest. Because I think so much of the film industry is focused on the coasts."

Travis' credits includes Discovery's A Crime to Remember (she was the background casting coordinator and became story producer and writer her final season), Amazon's The New Yorker Presents (researcher), and MeTV's Sventoonie (produc-

er). The Belladonna Film Project also features several other locals, including Board President

Angela Ramey. She is the Performing Arts Program Director at the John Michael Kohler Arts Center and is the District 5 Alderperson for Sheboygan.

The Board Secretary and Director of Marketing and Community Development is Hannah Kaiser, a marketing profession-

al who is based in Sheboygan.

The Board Treasurer is 2008 Plymouth graduate Steph Stanczyk, who is a technical accounting professional based in Chicago.

Three board members are Patty Talen (Artistic Director of the Youth Theatre Company in Plymouth), Mike Hanlon (ninth year with the Sheboygan Area School District) and Joe Pollock (assistant professor of Studio Art at Lakeland University).

First RSV child fatality reported

Put a twist on the traditional cupcake

Cupcakes are diminutive, hand-held treats that come in a variety of flavors and styles. Each December, the humble cupcake gets its own day of celebration (December 15), but people know well that cupcakes are enjoyed throughout the year, particularly during birthdays and other special occasions.

It may seem like there is no way to reinvent the cupcake, but "Sticky Cinnamon-Walnut Spirals" marry the best of cinnamon rolls with the convenience of a muffin/cupcake tin preparation to form a flavor-packed product that can either be breakfast, brunch or dessert. Try this recipe, courtesy of "Small Sweet Treats" (Gibbs Smith) by Marguerite Marceau Henderson, to elevate your cupcake game.

Sticky Cinnamon-Walnut Spirals Serves 6

- 1/2 cup dried currants
 - 1 cup hot water
 - 1 sheet frozen puff pastry (from 17.3-ounce package), room temperature
 - 1 tablespoon butter, melted
 - 1 teaspoon finely grated orange zest
 - 1/2 cup finely chopped walnuts
 - 1/2 cup packed dark brown sugar
 - 1 teaspoon ground cinnamon
 - 1 tablespoon butter, melted
 - 1 tablespoon sugar
- Place currants in a bowl and pour hot water over top to



cover. Steep for 15 minutes and then drain off excess water. Cool currants to room temperature.

Roll out the pastry on a work surface. Brush the pastry with the melted butter. Combine the orange zest, walnuts, brown sugar, cinnamon, and reserved currants in a bowl. Spread the mixture evenly over the pastry. Roll up jelly-roll style, loosely. Place seam side down and cut into six slices, each about 2-inches wide.

Brush the interior of the muffin tin with the remaining tablespoon of melted butter and sprinkle with sugar. Place the cut slices of pastry into each muffin cup. Bake on the middle rack of a preheated 400 F oven for 22 to 25 minutes until golden brown and puffed. Allow to cool for a minute or two before removing from muffin pan.

Note: This recipe easily can be doubled. Just use two sheets of pastry, double the filling, and use a 12-cup muffin tin.

Politicians root for home team

A lot of pundits and political observers focus on the conflict and controversy at the Capitol.

And a lot of that focus is newsworthy and important such as the debate between the Republican Legislature and Dem Gov. Tony Evers on gubernatorial appointments, spending priorities, tax cuts, and

managing UW-Madison and the Universities of Wisconsin.

But the political community in Wisconsin can look at some major, bipartisan accomplishments this year, too, such as big changes to shared revenue for local government and a deal to keep the Milwaukee Brewers in Wisconsin.

Let's focus on the Brewers ballpark maintenance bill.

Evers recently signed legislation that will put more than \$500 million in taxpayer money toward upkeep at the Brewers' American Family Field through 2050, saying it will allow a generation of Wisconsinites to grow up rooting for the state's baseball team like he did.

During a signing ceremony at the ballpark, Evers recalled meeting Hank Aaron while he was a Cub Scout and watching Warren Spahn win his 300th game at old County Stadium in 1961. Evers was 9 years old at the time when Spahn was a member of the Milwaukee Braves.

Evers said the team has been an essential part of the culture and identity of Milwaukee and the state, as well as part of their success by generating billions in annual economic impact and providing family-supporting jobs.

"Losing this team would've had a ripple effect felt by families and communities across the

state, even far beyond Milwaukee and southeastern Wisconsin," Evers said.

Under the deal, the state is scheduled to commit \$365.8 million to maintenance through 2050, while Milwaukee County and the city will kick in \$135 million combined. The package also includes a ticket tax

for non-Brewers events that will increase twice over the life of the 27-year deal with that money helping to offset the state's commitment.

The bill also puts in place a new board that will oversee the stadium and negotiate a new lease and non-relocation agreement with the team. It includes six appointments each for the

governor and the two majority party leaders in the Legislature. Evers' picks include two spots reserved for people nominated by Milwaukee County and the city.

The team will get the 13th spot. It will send Evers a list of at least three names from which to pick that final appointment.

Once those are in place, the state will pay \$35.8 million to the district for maintenance costs. It also will pay another \$25 million to winterize the facility before the annual payments kick in next year.

Until a majority of the new board members are in place,

Evers Administration Secretary Kathy Blumenfeld or her designee will approve regular disbursements of the district.

Metropolitan Milwaukee Association of Commerce President Tim Sheehy has been serving as chair of the outgoing board.

He said it was remarkable that the smallest market in Major League Baseball has found

a way to maintain the stadium through 2050 rather than building a new one.

American Family Field opened in 2001 after the Legislature approved a five-county sales tax to help fund construction in 1995.

By comparison, the Atlanta Braves replaced a stadium that opened in 1997 with a new one in 2017 and the Texas Rangers did the same in 2020 for a park that opened in 1994.

"The Vegas odds would've

been 99-to-1 that we would be at this point talking about a new stadium" in Milwaukee, he said.

State Sen. Chris Larson, D-Milwaukee, has been a fierce critic of the deal and has continued the criticism. He bemoaned in a post on X about the "frenzied rush to give away \$500 million of your money." He noted the current lease wasn't up until 2030 and pointed out the lease with the Baltimore Orioles expires at the end of December and negotiations are

still ongoing between the team and the state.

According to Baltimore media, the holdup on that deal includes the team's resistance to signing a long-term lease without development rights at the stadium complex.

"If only we hadn't swung at every wild pitch..." Larson wrote.

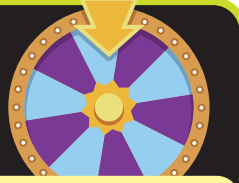



On a recent warm and breezy November day, I traveled up to Door County to cut down the first official Christmas tree of the Wisconsin holiday season! After a turn in the small town of Forestville, I knew I was in the right place when I came upon a classic red pick-up truck with a big Christmas tree in the bed!

I spent the morning learning from Randy Krueger of Krueger Tree Farms about his business, techniques to use a saw, and Christmas tree longevity tips. Local 5 Live news even stopped by to film the cutting of the Christmas tree and share information from Randy and me with viewers. The Kruegers, located in Sturgeon Bay, were such wonderful hosts and knowledgeable producers! Learn more about their season on their Facebook page @KruegerTreeFarm.

According to the Wisconsin Farm Bureau Federation, more than 700,000 Christmas trees are harvested every year in our state, with a significant increase during the COVID-19 pandemic. In the 10-15 years that trees are grown before being harvested, they absorb carbon dioxide, release oxygen, and provide wildlife habitat. Once the tree is harvested, it is shaken to remove loose needles, wrapped to make for easier transporting, and loaded up for the trip to its new home for the holidays. On average, two or three trees are planted the fol-

lowing spring for each tree that is cut down, continuing the cycle of benefits.

Whether you get your tree right after Thanksgiving, or wait until closer to Christmas, there are plenty of best practices for keeping your tree looking fresh right up until your gatherings. A well-cared-for tree should remain fresh at least three to four weeks before drying to an unsightly level. The Wisconsin Christmas Tree Producers Association is your one stop resource for all things Wisconsin Christmas trees, and they share the following tips:

- Avoid whittling down the

sides of the trunk to fit a stand as the outer layers of wood are the most efficient in taking up water and should not be removed.

- For most Christmas trees, the stand should hold at least 1 gallon of water. A cut tree will absorb a surprising amount of water, particularly during the first week, so replenish the water daily.

- Check the stand daily and add water to make sure that the level of water does not go below the base of the tree.

- Keep displayed trees away from sources of heat (fireplaces, heaters, heat vents, and direct sunlight).

- Monitor your tree for dryness. Run your fingers across the needles to determine if they are dry and brittle. If the needles break easily or fall off in your hand, the tree is dry and should be removed from the house.

After the holiday season is over and you are ready to dispose of your Christmas tree, there are some environmentally-friendly options you can take. The exact options will vary based on your location, so a little bit of research can help identify your plan of action. Generally speaking, Christmas trees are primarily recycled in

a few main ways. Many local municipalities will collect trees after the season ends to turn them into mulch. This mulch is then used as a weed barrier, along walking paths, and more. Some locations will put trees out on a frozen lake so after the lake thaws, trees will become submerged and form fish habitat. These biodegradable trees can also be left outside in appropriate locations after removing all decorations to become wildlife habitat or to decompose back into the environment. It is important to not burn your Christmas tree in your fireplace because the sap will add to creosote build-up, which can become a fire risk.

Hello friends,
This week's column is a whopper of success and happiness ...
Friday, December 8th
High 53, low 29

MacKenzie Environmental Education Center is managed by the WDNR and a goldmine for outdoor education with sleeping and dining facilities. The vast property was one of my favorite biking hangouts as a young boy while growing up in nearby Poynette. KAMO "Kids And Mentors Outdoors" (www.kamokids.org) has six very active chapters in Wisconsin. KAMO was started by readers of this column and yours truly back in 2007, and our purpose is to get kids outside in a variety of ways.

I think our first Joe Hunt was in 2009 and what we do is have a simulated deer camp at MacKenzie where a few of the kids hunt the property, and the majority of this year's group of 23 young hunters, hunt private land. Before I forget, thank you to all of the private landowners that help us out.

This is a WDNR Learn to Hunt. Lots of paths are required to have a successful hunt. Kevin Seymour is an old friend of mine from when we were in middle school worked out most of our paperwork which is so immense it can cause brain

hemorrhaging, when you consider paperwork for kids and mentors. Rick Miotke is another buddy of mine since we were kids and took over our kitchen this year with the help of many others. Rick and Kevin are from The Baraboo River Chapter of KAMO.

Bob Brodeur is quite possibly the heart and soul of this hunt. Bob was one year younger than me growing up and runs the show at The Lake Wisconsin Chapter. Bob along with his wife Linda, son Josh, and grandson Jameson, figure out land acquisitions, where kids are going to hunt and with what mentor as well as our massive deer pole which they build and take down each year.

This weekend I will be hunting with Carsyn Thiede, an 8th grader at Mayville Middle School. Her 11-year-old brother Conner would be mentored by

his 20-year-old brother Tanner Weber. I have been doing three hunts a year with these kids for two years and we have a blast; they can handle my level of insanity, they are active and fun.

The deer were extremely active and good training for our kids. We ended with a 7-pointer and three antlerless deer on the meat pole for our first night.

After a great meal and a class given by WDNR conservation warden Ben Gruber, the kids from all over Wisconsin began meshing together and running around like a bunch of coyotes.

Cubbyhole," that they socialized at and I poured many tap beers for customers starting at the age of 7. I also had a great aunt and uncle with a bordering farm.

Last night, Carsyn and I had three separate turkey experiences and one deer.

No shots were fired and this morning both Conner and Carsyn were hoping to harvest a deer, or a turkey, and it would be the first for The Joe. About 8:00 this morning, we heard a shot in Conner's direction and it turned out that he had dropped a very large doe.

This afternoon, Carsyn and I had moved our blind about 50 yards, as we had seen 11 deer in that area but could not get a shot. Good luck came Carsyn's way when a group of turkey came through and she harvested her first-ever turkey and the first for The Joe. I was with Carsyn

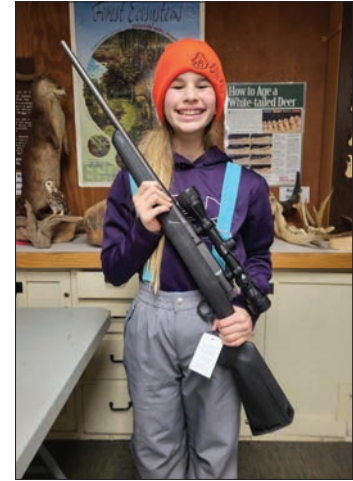
