# South High casualties of Vietnam War honored

In observance of Memorial Day, The Beacon is continuing its two-part series, begun during Veterans Day month last November, to recognize local high school alumni killed in action during the Vietnam War. In this installment, we will focus on seven soldiers from Sheboygan South High School.

Navy veteran Steve Conto of Sheboygan inspired this special feature with his latest tribute to Vietnam War veterans who gave their lives: displays of personalized, photo-bearing

plaques on “Walls of Valor” at area high schools. This is part of his 20-year-plus quest to honor Wisconsin soldiers lost in Vietnam, document their final resting places, care for their graves and ensure that they are not forgotten.

In the first such ceremony of many held around the county over the past year, seven of these plaques were dedicated at Sheboygan South High School on Redwing Pride Day last May, with about 25 family members, friends and classmates of the late veterans attending. The plaques are hung in a display case on the Wall of Valor in the hallway next to the field house. The inscription above the plaques reads as follows:

At one time they walked our halls and sat in our classrooms. They were our friends and classmates; now they are our heroes.

Alumni who gave the ultimate sacrifice during the Vietnam War

The display was made possible by a donation from Sheboygan Elks Lodge #299 and Elks member Mike Liebelt, Class of 1969, in memory of his good friend and classmate Eugene Fricke.

Conto recognized each of the veterans individually on that day and offered this reflection: “They were just like us. They had the same hopes and dreams: a wife, family, career, retirement. This was denied them. They gave all of their tomorrows for our todays.”

He shared these personal stories of each veteran recognized with The Beacon:

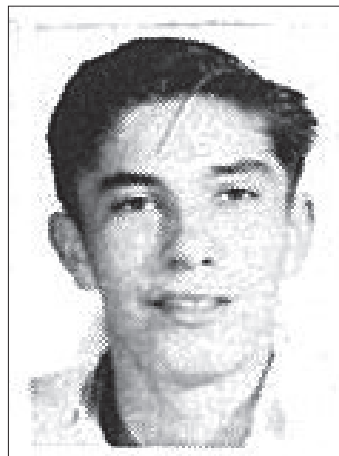
Raymond Berger: “He was

well liked by everyone in his class and is remembered to this day by them. He drowned after saving a comrade who was being swept away in a drainage ditch. He is buried at Holy Cross Cemetery next to his mother.”

Lester “Butchie” Biehl: “He was the first casualty of the Vietnam War from Sheboygan. He died in a vehicle accident just weeks before his unit returned back to the states. Prior to serving in the Navy, Lester sang in a folk group. He had a girlfriend named Patty who loved him and a sister who misses him so. Lester is buried next to parents at the Lutheran Cemetery west of Kiwanis Park in town.”

Arleigh Felch: “Arleigh dropped out of school after his

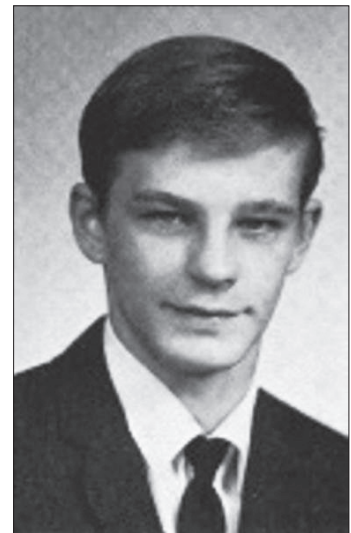

# School building plans get mixed response

If the size and mood of the crowd at two recent community input sessions was any indication, one part of the Sheboygan Area School District's plan to rebuild the aging and outdated Urban and Farnsworth Middle Schools may be more controversial than the other - although there is organized opposition to both.

About 100 people turned out on May 16 to the first session focusing on Urban, where the tone was confrontational and voices were loud from the outset. Many in the audience seemed to have come in response to outreach by an opposition group called the Sheboygan Taxpayers Alliance, which handed out its materials at both sessions.

When district staff offered tours of the building, they were met with a chorus of nos.

"We're here to get questions answered. We're not here for a tour," one man shouted out. And non-stop questions, comments and proposals of their own they had, at stations set up around the Urban library, for the next hour.

Most people there crowded around Superintendent Seth Havartine, who shared data supporting the district's plan but emphasized that the community can weigh in on a survey that just concluded on May 22, as well as at the polls if the proposal goes to referendum in November.

The district has proposed building an entirely new Urban Middle School on the corner of Mill and Najacht roads and that choice of location came under constant fire, with audience members - most of whom

seemed to live nearby, on the north side of the city - citing safety and traffic concerns and arguing that alternate sites would be better.

Only half as many people attended the next session on May 20 at Farnsworth, on the south side of the city, which was calm compared to the other one. Some of the same opposition group members were there, but others who appeared to be unaffiliated were also, and there seemed to be more openness to the district's plan for rebuilding Farnsworth on the existing Union Avenue site.

However, the opposition group floated its own, alternate proposal at both sessions, passing out information sheets titled, "Does Sheboygan Really Need Three Middle schools?"

"The Farnsworth Middle School property is too small to build a new school to match to-

day's standards," the handout states. "It would make more sense to add onto the Horace Mann Middle School which has 54 acres to work with. That would be less expensive than a whole new building."

The group also claims that other property the district owns, such as the Field of Dreams off Taylor Drive or the former Polar Ware site on 15<sup>th</sup> Street, would be better locations than the Mill Road one the district selected for the new Urban Middle School. They have distributed signs with a red slash through the words "Urban School on Mill Road," which are popping up nearby.

Havartine and other administrators say that these have been studied but would be prohibitively expensive to develop and are not strategically located.

"My house is older than this building, and I wouldn't think of

tearing it down and building a new one," said one woman at the Urban session. "What would the cost be to upgrade this existing building?"

Havartine replied that cost would be about 72 percent of building new, but would not even begin to address one of the biggest drawbacks: too-small classrooms, which exist at both middle schools, allow little flexibility and are incompatible with modern learning methods.

The audience had many questions at both sessions about enrollment, which Havartine

has declined about 5 percent over the past five years but may be offset by future housing development.

Havartine is retiring at the end of this school year and will be replaced by Assistant Superintendent of Student and Instructional Services Jacob Konrath, who was also at both of the sessions and helped answer questions.

junior year. He spent two years in the Naval Reserve before joining the Marines when he turned 21. During this time, he got married to the former Nancy Eckes from Sheboygan and became a father. His extended his tour in Vietnam and was one month shy of transferring out when he was wounded in action on August 3, 1967. Nancy was hospitalized when she received the news. Two days later while still in the hospital, she learned that Arleigh had passed away. In November of 2021, she joined her husband. They're buried together at Calvary Cemetery. I guess Buck Owens and Susan Raye were right, there are Sweethearts in Heaven."

Eugene Fricke: "Eugene was best friends with Mike Liebelt who paid for all the plaques. Eugene was the more serious, reserved one. Eugene was killed in action in a fire fight. He received the Bronze Star for his bravery. Eugene is buried in the Lutheran Cemetery. As with the rest, I tend to his site."

William "Willie" Kotnik: "He was a prankster. His brother told me you never knew what

Willie was up to. An illness he contracted while in Vietnam took his life. Willie is buried in Greendale Cemetery."

Roman Leicht: "He was killed in action during a fire fight after a grenade landed near him. It was less than a year after he graduated. His family said he was the center of their lives. Roman lived for every moment he had. He is buried in Wildwood Cemetery on the hill across from the VFW Post."

Eugene Plier: "Eugene was career Army and had served for 17 years at the time of his death. He was killed in action on October 17, 1967, in a fire fight alongside his men. He was the father of Carol, a classmate of mine. I did not learn until years later that her father had died in Vietnam when she was very young. Sadly, when locating his grave a few years ago, I found out that Carol had joined her father in 2006. Eugene and Carol along with her mother are buried in Calvary Cemetery, next to North High School."

Conto said his ultimate goal is to help the community realize that all of these lost soldiers mean far more than "just another plaque on a wall."

## Kaiser agrees to plea deal for theft

Krisi L. Kaiser, 43, formerly of Sheboygan, currently Waldo, agreed to a deal with prosecutors May 20 to plead no contest to one felony count of theft for stealing over \$168,000 over the span of five years from the Sheboygan County Home Builders Association, where she worked as the association's sole employee at the time.

The deal includes the prosecutors' recommendation of seven years probation, with "conditions free to argue," according to court records. No jail time is specified.

Her attorney requested additional time before sentencing to work on paying restitution. Earlier in the year, her attorney told the court that she was "very close to 33% of restitution being paid."

Court Judge Natasha Torry will decide the final sentence at the sentencing hearing July 15. The judge can potentially set terms different from the prosecution's recommendation.

Kaiser was accused of using the money to make unauthorized purchases at liquor and grocery stores, casinos, streaming TV providers, airlines, and more.

# New dam a major upgrade for old marsh

From a natural rock outcropping that blocked glacial melt waters eons ago, to a simple, concrete spillway that held up for 86 years, to a state-of-the-art, \$3.7 million, crest gate structure that was just erected, the Sheboygan Marsh Dam has evolved over centuries.

Nearly 200 supporters, dignitaries and donors turned out to celebrate the dam's latest incarnation at a festive dedication ceremony hosted by Ducks Unlimited on Sunday, May 19.

Attendees strolled on a new walkway designed to be wider and more accessible, gazed down at the rushing water, enjoyed refreshments under a large, white tent, heard from more than a half-dozen speakers and took lots of photos.

"Wow, what a day, huh? You couldn't have asked for better weather, in a great location where clearly, everybody is getting out and enjoying everything going on out here that nature has to offer," Wisconsin DNR Wildlife Management Bureau Director Eric Lobner told the crowd squeezed into the tent.

The new dam features a hydraulic ram that moves the spillway up or down as well as two 8-foot screw gates on one side, which allow for better control of water levels and cattail clogs. These improvements will enhance 14,000 acres of wetland habitat, have a positive impact on wildlife and improve opportunities for hunting and recreation, Lobner said.

"Not only will it help the 15 threatened and endangered species that call the Sheboygan Marsh home, but it will also help countless other species," he pointed out.

Lobner added that the new structure will enable occasional draw-downs to firm up the marsh bottom, promote beneficial vegetation growth and attract new waterfowl and shorebirds.

On its web page about the project, contractor Lunda Construction said the dam will help protect for decades to come "the jewel of ecological biodiversity" that is the Sheboygan Marsh.

The dam holds back 133 square miles of watershed and long-standing problems with water level spikes and cattail issues were major drivers of the project, according to Sheboygan County Planning & Conservation Director Aaron Brault.

Over the last five years, "we have spent an average of about \$45,000 a year on cattail removal," which was a labor-intensive endeavor for staff, he said. "Nobody wants to spend tax dollars on cattail removal."

With the old dam, highly fluctuating water levels would often cause cattail mats to tear off, drift downstream and clog up the spillway. The new dam will allow water levels to be adjusted as needed and floating debris to be more easily dispatched.

"We're also working on a new boardwalk to actually get people who don't have a boat out to the marsh," Brault added, explaining that grant funding will pay for it.

Ducks Unlimited Manager of Conservation Programs Brian Glenzinski praised the new dam's "Cadillac design" which will allow its operators to "tweak this to perfection to get the best habitat out there that we can possibly have." He added that the conservation community in Sheboygan County is one of the most active in the nation.

André Carriveau, Ducks Unlimited director of development, explained that the first feasibility study for the new dam was conducted in 2012 and construction commenced in February 2023.

Behind him and the other speakers, American, Canadian, Mexican and Wisconsin flags flapped in the breeze, commemorating the flyways where Ducks Unlimited maintains habitat.

Major contributors to the \$3.7 million project included Sheboygan County, the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources, the Sheboygan County Conservation Association, the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, the National Fish and Wildlife Foundation the Fund for Lake Michigan & Ducks Unlimited philanthropic donors. State Representative Terry Katsma and Senator

Devin LeMahieu advocated for key legislative funding.

Other donors who contributed \$10,000 or more via Ducks Unlimited's Great Lakes Initiative received awards at the event: David & Jodi Nett, Dan & Linda Gru-

enke, Hubert & Diana Nett, Bank First, Dawn Race on behalf of Jim & Dawn Race, Bill & Sue Lorenz, Riverside Hunting & Fishing Club, Chip & Lynn Beckford, Ralph & Bonnie Heinen and Brian "Rook" Voss.

## Woman gets 11 years for homicide

Sheboygan woman Makita M. Jones, 26, was sentenced to 11 years in prison May 17 for causing the death of Angela Williams, 37, of Sheboygan, who was a passenger in Jones's car when Jones drove off a North Ave., Sheboygan cliff last September.

Jones accepted a deal with prosecutors to plead no contest to one count of homicide by intoxicated use of vehicle.

According to the criminal complaint, Jones had just met Williams in a bar the night of the crash. They went on a ride, with Jones driving, that concluded with the car going 85 mph shortly before the crash,

according to the car's airbag data. Williams was found deceased, pinned between rocks and the vehicle, which was partially submerged in Lake Michigan.

Jones's blood alcohol level was .150, according to court records, almost twice the legal limit.

In addition to 11 years incarceration, Jones was sentenced by Sheboygan County Circuit Court Judge Natasha Torry to 9 years of extended supervision, 5 years driver's license revocation and ignition interlock. The prosecution's recommended sentence was 15 years in prison, 10 years extended supervision. A restitution request has also been filed, with a court hearing set for July 11.

# Lordy, Lordy, look who has 40 (players)

Despite finishing 14 games over .500 (37-23) last season, Sheboygan A's manager Tim Moyer says his squad did not reach most of their goals.

Adding players in the dugout might help.

"I think we're going to be pretty good this year," he said.

Sheboygan has a 40-man roster, and Moyer says he's unsure if the A's have ever had that many.

"But we lost so many people to the Northwoods, and injuries and stuff, last year that I decided we were going to have enough bodies now," he said.

### Fearsome foursome

It wouldn't be a summer in Sheboygan without Harry Steldt, an infielder who enters his 14th year with the club.

Last season, he had team highs in runs batted in (50) and walks (37), and he was second in runs (34) and hits (55).

Another key infielder will be Jacob Neese.

He appeared in the most games (59), and ranked second in doubles (12), home runs (4) and RBI (39).

Two outfielders are coming off stellar seasons, including Gus Walker.

He also played in 59 games, and had the most runs (40) and stolen bases (27).

The other is Brady Zackrisson, who was tops in hits (61), doubles (15), triples (3), homers (6) and batting average (.351).

"All the big guns are back," Moyer said.

### Pitching is a plus

Brad Rindfleisch returns after setting the team record for most strikeouts in a season last year (150), and his career total of 501 ranks sixth in Sheboygan history.

He also led the squad last season in starts (12), complete games (8) and innings (91).

Jared Reklaitis is also back after leading the A's with a 7-1 record, a 1.25 earned run average and three shutouts.

"Pitching is going to be really strong again," Moyer said.

## Fawn saved

Being on the job for only 10 months, Sheboygan police officer Ryan LeFebvre hasn't saved anyone's life or solved any murders. He has, however, rescued a baby fawn from perhaps getting run over on May 19.

The 24-year-old Chicago native and Port Washington resident, on the beat since August, had just started his shift that Sunday morning when a call came in that a small deer was on the side of the road at 25th Street and Calumet Drive with no mother in sight.

When LeFebvre arrived, he noticed the fawn kind of curled up next to the curb.

"I encountered the deer, and she was pretty scared," he said. "I mean, busy traffic is starting to go through. If I would have left it there ...

"I didn't want it to get up; it'd walk right into the road."

So LeFebvre picked up the fawn - he estimates she was a week or two old - and noticed there were some woods next to Evergreen Park.

"She was very, very calm, very relaxed," he said. "She wasn't shaking or anything."

Once closer to the woods, LeFebvre set the fawn down and saw she had a hard time walking.

"It was kind of typical for fawns to, you know, have that



kind of ice skating kind of walk to them when they're first born," he said.

LeFebvre then realized there were a few deer, including a doe, that were close to the edge of the woods.

"So I placed it down and I kind of wanted to walk away as quick as I could so the mom wouldn't run too far away," he said. "At first, the fawn was very adamant of trying to follow me. So I kind of had to bring it a little bit closer to the woods, because it really wanted to follow me everywhere I went."

"But then she stayed right there and I kind of ran - you know, quickly moved away. ... And when I turned around, I noticed that deer was slowly moving,

going towards the woods right where the doe was at."

LeFebvre then returned to his car and left once he knew the fawn was safe.

He later posted a picture online of the two of them.

"It's not very common that you get to hold a baby fawn, and it was so relaxed and was very content of just being held," LeFebvre said. "So I thought it was nice just to snap that picture and have a cool selfie with it. The fawn was actually looking at my phone the whole time, too."

"I know my parents were pretty happy about the picture just because they're both officers and, you know, they don't deal with deer in Chicago much."



# WILDERNESS JOURNAL

Hello friends,

Each May I go trout fishing somewhere in Wisconsin, so this week I headed down to Columbia County to fish Rowan Creek.

I grew up in Poynette and fished Rowan Creek hundreds of times as a kid, and I have to admit, those getaways were my escape from a drawn-out divorce that my parents went through when I was young boy.

Instead of fishing the easy-to-get-to waters, I chose to put my canoe in on the Wisconsin River and go to an area that is remote - and to be perfectly honest, very dangerous to get to.

**Sunday, May 12th**  
**High 73, low 44**

So here is the plan: with my 8-year-old golden retriever Ruby as my partner, I was going to canoe through very challenging shallow water that will soon become wild rice. If you get stuck, it seems like there is no bottom, as in muck.

Then it is at least a mile up Rowan Creek, and the last mile of this journey is one deadfall after the other crossing the creek. The shoreline is all marsh and I honestly feel that zero

people fish here as it is simply too difficult and dangerous. My 2-hour trip was finalized with a decision: I will never do this again. I have trapped, duck hunted and muzzleloader hunted back here, including one nine-day trip and once I trout fished and caught a 19-inch brown trout. The wild rice is creating and trapping sediment and where I ice fished as a boy, it is no longer fishable. The hole I planned on fishing was choked with deadfalls, so I traveled further upstream and found an L-shaped hole that was maybe 40 yards long and deep. This is where I would spend my next 24 hours.

As soon as I started to become comfortable, a powerful storm

smacked the heck out of Ruby and I. So I pulled a tarp over us and weathered it out. About 4:00, I became serious as far as catching trout and went with my usual small gold hook, a current appropriate split shot and a half a crawler.

For 2 hours nothing happened, but I knew I had to be patient. Good luck came my way when something big hit the crawler and fought like a bull in a China shop, using the current and its muscle. I landed what was a 17-inch brown trout, and as far as I was concerned, the trip was a success.

Another 2 hours went by, I was in my glory watching ducks and geese, and one time a hen wood duck just about took my head

off before it spotted me and just like that I had another big fish on.

Anyone that stream fishes for trout knows how insane it is keeping a big fish out of deadfalls, and that was the case today. In what for me seemed quite rare, my second trout was exactly 17 inches as well. Day became night, I only had the two bites, I switched to minnows after dark and fished for 2 hours with no action. In what was a last night for a while that you could do this, I slept on a tarp on the ground. As soon as I laid down it started raining. I covered up and made the best of it and had zero mosquito action.

**Monday, May 13th**  
**High 77, low 40**

I was fishing by 4:30 and confident. By 6:00, I had not had a bite. At 6:15, Moby Dick hit my crawler and when I first saw Moby I thought she was a carp. Then I realized Moby was a sumo brown trout. My third and last bite of this trip turned out to be a 22-inch brown trout, the biggest of my life.

I was careful on the handling and release, fished another 6 hours without anything significant happening, packed up and made the decision, possibly, I will return someday.

# Memorial expansion could honor 4,000 more veterans

As the Sheboygan County Veterans Memorial Board closes in on its \$200,000 fundraising goal to expand the sprawling monument and honor more local veterans, it is seeking donations from county-wide in the final stretch of its campaign and hoping to begin construction on phase one of the project in just two weeks.

Since the memorial's inception in 1994, the names of approximately 4,300 Sheboygan County veterans from all branches of the military have been inscribed on its black granite monoliths, but there are many more names eligible to be added - and space is running out.

So far, "we have raised \$144,000 of the \$200,000 needed to complete this expansion project, in a campaign that began in 2023," said board member Kathy Halloran of Plymouth. "The project will add two more walls and allow an additional 4,000 names to be inscribed."

Board President Allen Nohl of Howards Grove, who has led the memorial effort for the past 25 years, explained that "we did some research on how many veterans are in Sheboygan County

and found out that there are approximately 3,000 left who don't already have their names on the wall." The board wanted to add space to recognize 1,000 future veterans as well.

"This expansion should give us enough room to recognize all the veterans who have ever served in Sheboygan County. We will be set for the next ten to 15 years out," he noted. "It's important to honor all the people who have dedicated their lives to protect the freedoms of this great nation."

"We feel that Sheboygan County is very fortunate to have one of the most beautiful veterans memorials in Wisconsin and are honored to serve on the SCVM board," Halloran added. "We are a proud military family and have many loved ones recognized on the SCVM walls."

Both Halloran and her husband Dennis, who is a member of the Ladwig Zinkgraf American Legion Post and served in the Wisconsin National Guard for 20 years, are among the 16 members of the SCVM board.

"Our county memorial is better and bigger than some state veterans memorials, so we are very blessed to have this," Nohl remarked. "Our memorial is completely funded by donations from

companies and individuals. We don't receive any government money. I hope that individuals, families and businesses from all over Sheboygan County will support our project and help us reach our \$200,000 goal. Donations of any size - \$10, \$50 or \$100 - always help."

Soon work will begin on the first phase of the expansion, which will include installation of a foundation and lighting. Nohl hopes that the new walls will be up and the project will be complete by early September or October.

Over the past five years or so, requests to inscribe additional names on the memorial's walls have come in at a clip of 130 to 150 per year, according to him.

"We already have 67 name requests this year," Nohl said. "The deadline for requests is September 15 and application forms are available on our website."

Veterans and/or their families can submit a request and make a \$200, tax-deductible donation to get additional names inscribed on the memorial.

"We have a name dedication ceremony on the second Saturday in October every year. We invite the vets and their families to come," Nohl pointed out.

"This year's name dedication will be on Saturday, October 12," he continued. "It's like a big family reunion. At the last one, we had over 500 people there to

support our veterans, and that was on a rainy, cold day. I can't thank people enough for coming out in the weather conditions we had."

A Vietnam veteran originally from Johnsonville himself, Nohl feels compelled to continue serving the SCVM cause.

"I was the sole survivor of a helicopter crash and am motivated to do this in part because I believe that I was saved for something," he said.

The Sheboygan County Veterans Memorial is located at 3091 Wilgus Avenue in Sheboygan, on the north slope of Taylor Park, across from Kohler Memorial Drive/Highway 23.

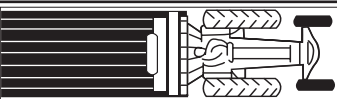

The agricultural workforce is shrinking, and has been for some time. The American Farm Bureau Federation estimates there are roughly 2.4 million farm jobs that need to be filled annually, but there has been a drastic decline in workers each year.

There are a number of reasons for the shortages. The AFBF says more than 73 percent of farm workers are immigrants from South America and Mexico. While the United States' H2-A visa program, which allows employers who meet specific requirements to bring foreign laborers in for temporary work, has increased the number of accepted applications for immigrants to 250,000, this number is still just a drop in the bucket in terms of labor needs.

Another factor is a career in agriculture isn't always easy or lucrative. According to the U.S. Department of Agriculture, for every dollar spent on food, a farmer receives only 7.6 cents. Farmers were predicted to lose 9.7 percent of total net income in 2021.

Declining interest in the field has also affected the number of farm workers. As more farm operators reach retirement age, fewer young farmers are replacing them due to volatile pricing, high real estate and land costs, steep initial machinery investment costs, and other factors. The physical demand of the industry also takes its toll. So what does this mean for the agricultural industry?

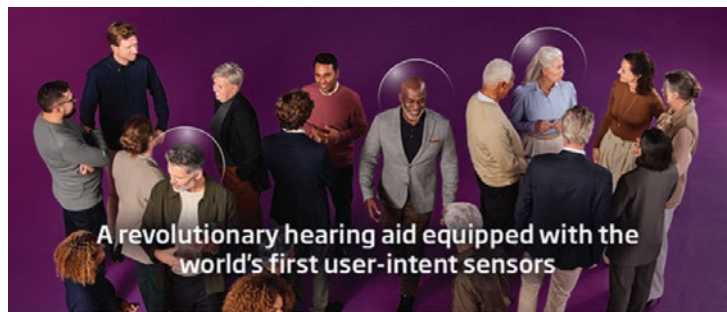
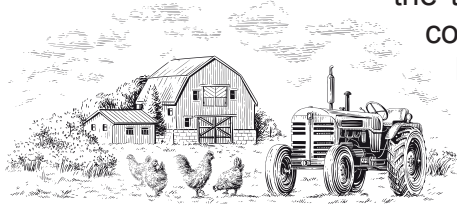
Many with knowledge of the industry indicate sweeping changes are warranted. Ellen Poeschi, the project director for the National Association of Agricultural Educators Teach Ag campaign, has said that a lack of agricultural education is contributing to the problem. Increasing availability of ag education courses across the country could build interest in the industry. Connecting students to internships or mentors may help, too.

Another option is to rally for greater economic opportunities in agriculture. The ag industry in general needs to find ways to make the economic benefits more competitive to other industries, and improve the working conditions and job flexibility. Agricultural industries currently average only 60 percent of what other industries offer in salaries. Farm wages have been rising due to the H-2A program, which requires farm worker pay to be higher than the state/federal minimum wage. Additional strategies farm operators can employ to combat shortages are: scaling back farm operations; integrating ag technology to reduce labor burdens; pivoting to crops that require fewer laborers; leasing portions of land to have extra money; employing temporary guest workers; and moving operations abroad.

### Tractor Noise & More Affect Hearing Loss

Everyone knows the life of a dairy farmer is filled with... distinct smells. An onslaught on the nostrils, if you will. People might not know, though, that the farmer's nose isn't the only thing under attack, but also the ears.

Farmers, and agricultural workers in general, are in one of the top 3 fields for hearing loss. This is due to a variety of factors. It can be noisy work: tractors, forage harvesters, silage blowers, chain saws, skid-steer loaders, grain dryers, and other equipment subject farmers to a long day of ear-damaging noise. Studies suggest that lengthy exposure to these high sound levels has resulted in noise-induced hearing loss to farmers of all ages, including teenagers. Some of this equipment, though, has gotten better over the years, like having cabs in tractors, quieter engines and other safety measures that protect hearing. Awareness has also increased, and many farmers now wear hearing protection, such as ear covers or custom ear plugs (which you can order at Welsch Hearing Aid Company).

However, while farm life may have dropped a few decibels, with the increased use of pesticides, farmers are having to deal with the effects, which can cause hearing loss also. Certain pesticides are classified as neurotoxins. They are ototoxic when they damage the ear by destroying the nerve fibers that interfere with hearing and balance. They can also be deemed cochleotoxicants if they mainly affect the cochlear hair cells, which are the sensory receptors, and can impair the ability to hear. If they affect the hair cells on the spatial orientation and balance organs, these chemicals are considered vestibulotoxicants.

Exposure to these chemicals combined with the high levels of noise in farm work increases the risk of hearing loss to the point that there is growing concern among occupational health and safety professionals that ototoxicant-induced hearing loss may go unrecognized since the measure for hearing loss does not indicate the cause. For example, hearing tests are powerful tools that show hearing impairments; however, they do not differentiate between noise and ototoxic causes.

Harmful exposure to ototoxicants occurs through inhalation, ingestion, or skin absorption. Since chemicals can affect central portions of the auditory system (e.g., nerves or nuclei in the central nervous system, the pathways to the brain or in the brain itself), not only do sounds need to be louder to be detected, but they also lose clarity. Specifically, speech discrimination dysfunction (the ability to hear voices separately from background noise) may occur, which makes hearing in noisy environments difficult and increases the risk of workplace injuries due to an inability to hear co-workers, environmental sounds, and warning signals.

## The link between agriculture and food security

The world faces many unique challenges in the decades to come, including a rapidly expanding global population. The United Nations estimates that the global population will reach 9.71 billion in 2050. That's an increase of more than 1.7 billion people between 2023 and 2050.

Food security is among the more significant challenges the world will face as the population increases. The United States Agency for International Development notes that food security means all individuals, regardless of their physical or economic circumstances, have access to sufficient food to meet the dietary needs for a productive, healthy life. Food security is a more significant issue than people may recognize, even in first world, fully developed countries. For example, the United States Department of Agriculture's Economic Research Service indicates that slightly more than 10 percent of U.S. households were food insecure at some point during 2021.

In fact, estimates suggest more than 800 million people across the globe go to bed hungry every night, which underscores the seriousness of the issue.

### Agriculture and food security

Food security and the agricultural industry are inextricably linked. The USAID indicates that most of the people who go to bed hungry at night are smallholder farmers who depend on agriculture to make a living and feed themselves and their families. Supporting efforts to strengthen the agricultural industry can help to combat food security, as the USAID reports that growth within that sector has been found to be at least twice as effective at reducing poverty as growth in other sectors. Much of that can be traced to the disproportionate percentage of poor people who live in rural rather than urban areas. For example, the USAID reports that 75 percent of poor people in developing nations live in rural areas.

But the poverty rate is higher in rural areas than urban areas in the United States as well. Data from the 2019 American Community Survey indicates the poverty rate in rural areas was 15.4 percent in 2019 compared to 11.9 percent in urban areas. Though recent data regarding rural poverty rates in Canada is unavailable, a 2013 discussion paper on the topic from the Government of Canada noted that the country's rural residents earned less and had lower levels of education than residents in urban areas, suggesting that poverty is likely more prevalent in the Canadian countryside than in the country's cities.

### What can be done

Though food security poses a significant global challenge, lack of access to healthy foods is preventable. Individuals in rural and urban communities can voice their support for efforts to strengthen the agricultural sector. A thriving agricultural sector can ensure fewer people go to bed hungry each night and bolster the economies of rural communities that are disproportionately affected by poverty.

What is your favorite Wisconsin tradition? With such a strong focus on community, foods, and pride in our state, there's so many to choose from! One of our more delicious traditions is the Friday night fish fry, and it's for good reason. Wisconsin is home to several dozen commercial fisheries and farms where fish are raised for consumption, plus many of our lakes and rivers offer a multitude of fish for at-home eating!

As part of the 77th Alice in Dairyland finals in Door County, Top Candidates and I visited Baileys Harbor Fish Company, owned and operated by the Hickey brothers. We watched as the small team processed that morning's catch of whitefish from Lake Michigan while learning more about their business from Dennis Hickey and his daughter, Carin.

Early each morning, as conditions allow, the team starts their days out on the lake. The nets they use contain the fish but keep them alive, allowing the crew to put back fish that are undersized or of the wrong species, helping ensure the sustainability of the fish popula-

tion. Whitefish or yellow perch are their usual targets. Once that sorting is completed, the fish are brought back to Baileys Harbor for processing.

The fish are again sorted, this time just by size, and are sent through several steps, with the end result being two fresh fish filets from each fish. Baileys Harbor Fish Company offers both retail and wholesale options, so further processing depends on their end destination. The filets can be packaged fresh, frozen, smoked, or turned into value added products like their delicious whitefish spread!

Commercial fisheries like Baileys Harbor Fish Company are primarily on Lake Michigan, though we also have a couple on Lake Superior. These companies are allotted

a quota and must share data at various intervals with the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources to help maintain a healthy fish population. According to eatwisconsinfish.org, other commercially caught species here in Wisconsin include walleye, lake trout, burbot, and more.

Farm raised fish are also quite common here in Wisconsin, helping ensure a steady supply of some of our favorites, like trout, tilapia, salmon, and even shrimp. This process is called aquaculture and is a growing industry in our state and across the country. There are a variety of methods to raise these fish, including aquaponics systems which allow vegetables like lettuce to be grown on top of the water that the fish are being

raised in. Wisconsin is home to the largest aquaponics facility in the world, Superior Fresh, located in Hixton, WI. There are a handful more companies raising fish in this way spread throughout the state, but the ecosystem the fish and plants live in looks similar no matter the company.

As the fish are growing, they are naturally producing waste that is fertilizing the water they live in. These nutrients feed the plants, resulting in an efficient and sustainable process. The water can be recycled through the systems and the plants help to purify the water while growing. Superior Fresh shares that for every five pounds of fish feed they input, they are able to harvest about six times that weight in fish and leafy greens.

Nelson and Pade Inc., an aquaponics company in Milton focused on education and research, has grown more than 20 different crop species in their systems, including beans, peas, broccoli, sunflowers, aloe, and even lemons and pomegranates!

With such a supply of healthy, delicious fish, there is no wonder that the Friday night fish fry is one of our more popular traditions. Whether cooking it up at home or going out for the night, try to support local fisheries and the restaurants and businesses that utilize their harvests. 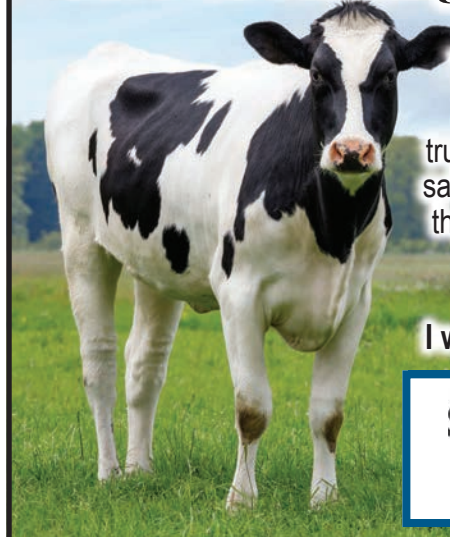
