



SHEBOYGAN - Are you a registered nurse or physician looking to make a difference in the lives of Sheboygan County community members? Sheboygan County is looking for a registered nurse or physician who lives in Sheboygan County to apply for an open position on the Sheboygan County Health & Human Services Committee. The person selected will serve a three-year term. The Committee meets on the first and third Tuesday of each month at 8:30 a.m. at the Sheboygan County Health & Human Services Building, located at 1011 North 8th Street, Sheboygan. They are also given the option to attend the meetings virtually.

The Health & Human Services Committee provides oversight to Sheboygan County's Health and Human Services Department. The department aims to provide a wide range of human services, including healthcare, public health, mental health treatment, services for developmental disabilities, general

relief, income support, substance abuse services, and assistance for children, youth, and older adults. They focus on providing community services and facilities that help prevent and improve social, mental, and physical issues.

To qualify for the Health and Human Services Committee, a candidate must be a registered voter and a resident of Sheboygan County. Candidates should have experience and interest in human services, with priority given to a registered nurse or physician.

The County Administrator is responsible for making the citizen appointments to the Health & Human Services Committee, and these appointments are confirmed by the County Board. AG Kaul and ICAC Task Force raising awareness for children's online safety

MADISON – On Safer Internet Day 2026, Attorney General Josh Kaul and the Wisconsin Internet Crimes Against Children (ICAC) Task Force is raising awareness of some of the dangers kids currently face online and resources available for children, teens and parents.

“The Wisconsin ICAC Task Force monitors emerging and evolving online threats and works to raise awareness about online safety,” said AG Kaul. “By learning about online threats, parents can prepare to help their kids stay safe online.”

Two threats that teens currently face online include sadistic online exploitation and sextortion.

Sadistic online exploitation (SOE) occurs when offenders target children and persuade, induce, entice, or coerce them into recording themselves engaging in various types of degrading, humiliating, and violent acts. Examples of the acts can include carving the offender's name (or alias)

on their body with a knife; producing sexually explicit material of themselves; harming themselves, pets, family members, and others; and dying by suicide. Offenders may use threats—of violence, or of disclosing sensitive material showing the victim—to coerce a victim's compliance. SOE offenders often work together, and share information and material obtained from their victims in an effort to gain or enhance their status in the network. SOE is expanding, according to the National Center for Missing and Exploited Children.

Sextortion is a form of sexual exploitation where the offender threatens to release compromising material of the victim unless the victim sends money, gift cards, and/or additional sexual content, or engages in sexual activity. Children are particularly vulnerable to this type of crime. Sextortion has led to tragic consequences for victims, including mental health crisis and suicide. Sextortion is

a rising problem around the country. The Wisconsin ICAC Task Force has seen a steady increase in CyberTips related to sextortion over the past several years. Wisconsin DOJ released a public service announcement about sextortion in December 2025.

If you or someone you know is in crisis, the National Suicide Hotline is 988. You can call or text to reach a mental health professional.

Tips For Teens Who May Be Victims of Sextortion

- Remember, it's not your fault!
- It's never too late to get help. Tell a parent or trusted adult right away.
- Do not pay money or comply with the blackmailer's requests.
- Report the account through the platform's safety feature.
- Block the suspect, but DO NOT DELETE the messages or your profile to preserve potential evidence for law enforcement.
- Report the crime to

law enforcement or at CyberTipLine.com.

Online Safety Tips for Parents

The best way parents can protect children online is through creating and maintaining open lines of communication. Prepare your children for the online world by talking to them about dangers and risks online, as well as their online activity, including the websites they are visiting, the people they are communicating with, the information they are posting about themselves, and any situations that make them feel scared, uncomfortable, or confused. The Wisconsin ICAC Task Force offers a monthly newsletter for the public on internet related safety information. Building awareness of current online risks that children face, while encouraging youth to connect with trusted adults when faced with stressors, results in real time assistance during potentially quickly escalating situations. Rep. Brill releases report of the Speaker's Task Force on Protecting Kids

MADISON – Representative Lindee Brill (R-Sheboygan Falls) released the Report of the Assembly Speaker's Task Force on Protecting Kids on Jan. 23. The report outlines the work of the task force, provides recommendations for new legislation, endorses existing legislation, and makes recommendations for further legislative review. Representative Brill offered the following remarks:

“It is our calling as Wisconsinites and our duty as elected officials to protect the most innocent among us, our kids. That is why I am profoundly grateful to have chaired the Speaker's Task Force on Protecting Kids. The task force focused on how to prepare parents and protect kids in a digital age with rapidly changing technology. As families try to navigate the online landscape that their children can access at the click of a button, the task force examined the effects of social media on youth development, evaluated the benefits and drawbacks to children having unlimited, unsupervised access to the internet and social media, and assessed the risks and dangers of children being online anywhere and anytime.

“We held four hearings, receiving a wealth of testimony from organizations and individuals who all work hard in their own fields to keep kids safe in a digital age.

“Each hearing focused on a particular topic to keep kids safe: family, law enforcement, education, and mental health. We heard

testimony from such groups as The Anxious Generation Movement; the Department of Justice's ICAC Task Force; Mothers Against Media Addiction; the Watertown Community Health Foundation; the Wisconsin Alliance for Infant Mental Health; Thriving Wisconsin; and many others, including constituents of the 27th District like Kevin Bruggink, Oostburg School District Superintendent, and Isaiah Ketterhagen, an educator and parent at Oostburg High School.

“We worked diligently to translate this testimony into meaningful, effective legislation and, based on the information and pressing calls to action we received, introduced 12 new pieces of legislation across the areas of our focus: technology, education, law enforcement, and strengthening families. I ask my colleagues to join me in passing this legislation as we strive to fulfill our duty to protect our kids.”

New take and bake shop offers 30+ speciality pizzas

There's sausage and pepperoni, as well as the other usual toppings.

But Eaton's Fresh Pizza - a new take and bake in Sheboygan - offers plenty of non-traditional choices.

Thirty-six specialty pizzas, to be exact, including Cinnamon French Toast.

It just happens to be the pizza of the month, and features a cream cheese sauce, chunks of French toast sticks, bacon, cinnamon chips and Andrew's Pure Syrup (made in Wisconsin).

Sheboygan native Laura Schultz owns Eaton's Fresh Pizza, located at 2825 North 15th Street (formerly Little Ceaser's).

It officially opened Sunday and became the fifth Eaton's in the state.

"It's been a real ride," said Schultz, who lives in Newton. "It's amazing seeing it all come to life from just an idea/ thought. We offer restaurant

quality pizza that comes fresh out of your oven, and I'm really proud to say we offer that for Sheboygan. Serving my friends, family and community such an enjoyable experience brings me happiness."

Happiness also comes in the form of a Packer Pizza (mozzarella, sausage, pepperoni, hamburger, onions, green peppers, and cheddar cheese.) or a Badger Pizza (sausage, pepperoni, Canadian bacon, hamburger, bacon, and cheddar cheese).

If those don't work, Eaton's also offers Chicken Cordon Bleu (garlic chicken, ham, mozzarella, and Swiss cheese), Nacho (nacho cheese and salsa sauce with mozzarella, cheddar cheese, and tortilla chips - jalapenos can be added), New York Deli (pastrami, corned beef, sauerkraut, Swiss, pickles, and choice of pizza or creamy garlic sauce), Crab Italiano (crab, fresh mushrooms, onions and mozzarella), and Cajun (sausage, shrimp, crab, green peppers, fresh mushrooms, onions,

Cajun seasoning, and mozzarella).

"Create your Own" and gluten-free pizzas are also on the menu.

The store, which has its own app, also sells garlic bread, mac and cheese or ravioli bowls, breadsticks, Pine River cheese spread, Cedar Valley string cheese, Gibbsville cheese curds, taco dip, salsa, and snacks.

It even has enamel pins, greeting cards, and key chains.


Eaton's Fresh Pizza originated in Fond du Lac in 1980, after it replaced long-time grocery store Eaton's Market.

A few years later, another Eaton's Fresh Pizza opened in Fond du Lac.

It debuted in West Bend in 2018 and in Grafton in 2020.

"I just wanted a change in career," Schultz said. "My friend owns Eaton's Fresh Pizza and presented me with this opportunity."

And for those wondering what the pizza of the month will be in March, it's jalapeno popper.

News Notes

SHEBOYGAN - The Urban Middle School play production room is being considered for preservation. During the Historic Preservation Commission meeting on Feb. 16, member Wendy Schobert shared that she contacted the director of the Sheboygan

County Museum and asked if they would be interested in preserving the room. The middle school, along with Farnsworth Middle School, is set to be rebuilt/remodeled and the play production could be torn down during the renovations. No response

was received at the time of the meeting. The preservation of the play production room could be another agenda item in next month's Historic Preservation Commission meeting depending on the response from the County Museum.

Free day passes to WI state parks available

MADISON - The Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources (DNR) invites library patrons to use the Check Out Wisconsin State Parks At Your Library program to check out a free day pass to state parks, forests and recreation areas.

"There's always something new to discover when you explore Wisconsin's state parks," said Missy VanLanduyt, DNR recreation partnerships section supervisor. "We offer events, programs, guided hikes, skill-building opportunities and gear-loaner programs to help you make the most of your visit."

Check Out Wisconsin State Parks At Your Library is a collaborative effort between the DNR, the Wisconsin Department of Public Instruction and more than 120 libraries across the state to provide library cardholders the opportunity to check out a day pass to state parks, forests and recreation areas. Sheboygan's Mead Public Library is one of the participating libraries.

As the initiative moves into its fifth year, the DNR continues to encourage new users to check out the Wisconsin State Park System by utilizing this program. Check

Out Wisconsin State Parks At Your Library was launched in fall 2022, with 20 public libraries participating in the pilot program. In 2024, 160 libraries with over 200 library locations provided daily Wisconsin state park and forest vehicle admission passes for check out to library patrons at no cost.

Also in 2024, participation in the program was extended to all types of libraries, including specialized libraries. The University of Wisconsin-Madison and the University of Wisconsin-Superior were the first specialized libraries to carry day park passes.

Along with the day pass, library cardholders may receive an informational kit of state park system materials, including maps, stickers, accessibility information and more.

Library patrons are encouraged to review the visiting a state park webpage to help prepare for their visit.

Libraries interested in participating in this program and community partners and organizations interested in supporting their local library's participation should visit the Check Out Wisconsin State Parks At Your Library webpage.

North finished ahead of Middleton, Sussex Hamilton, Brookfield East and Manitowoc Lincoln.



Christian's Veldkamp sets school record

Christian's girls basketball team informed referees and Oostburg staff before its game Thursday that Samantha Veldkamp needed just one point to become the school's all-time leading scorer.

No one had to wait very long. The first basket of the game was scored by Veldkamp, who stole the ball and hit a short shot from the low post.

The Eagles called timeout, and the Oostburg public address announced informed the crowd of the milestone.

"They started cheering, there was a sign for me, and then I gave my dad and my teammates hugs," Veldkamp said. "And Oostburg, I'm good friends with a lot of their girls, so they all came and gave me hugs as well."

Veldkamp, a center who averages 19.7 points per game, was made aware of her point total earlier in the week.

"Yeah, I didn't really know I was that close until my dad (and coach) is all of a sudden like, 'huh, I wonder what the record is and how close Sam is,'" she said. "Then Monday morning, he comes up to me and goes, 'so Sam, you're only 28 points away from tying the record.'

"And I had a game Monday night, and I'm like, 'oh.' So we didn't really know until then, but it was good."

That's because that night in a home game against Valley Christian, Veldkamp scored 28 points to tie the record of 1,181 set by Hannah Modahl in 2016.

"I think it's a really, really, really cool opportunity that I was able to have," she said. "It still hasn't set in, because I didn't really know this was happening this year until that Monday. So it really hasn't set in yet, but I'm really, really, really excited that I get this opportunity to follow in Hannah Modahl's legacy that she set."

South's Daniel Fenske can.


He also holds the school record for most pins among boys wrestlers (55) after spending four seasons on varsity.

The Eagles welcome No. 12 Hilbert to town for another first-round tilt at 7 tonight. No. 4 Central Wisconsin Christian will likely be the second-round opponent at 7 p.m. Friday.

North is No. 7

The Golden Raiders host No. 10 Homestead in a Division 1 first-round game at 7 p.m. Friday. Regional finals are held Saturday, and the opponent is most likely to be second-seeded Appleton East.

A Look Back... on when Neil Diamond came to Plymouth

When Lakeland College announced that 26-year-old pop star Neil Diamond would be kicking off its Winter Carnival with a February 12, 1970 concert in small-town Plymouth, people couldn't believe it.

"We were in a state of shock that someone of his status was coming to Plymouth High School, since he was at the height of his popularity," said local musician and Sheboygan County Board Chairman Keith Ablner,

who was then 19 years old and hitchhiked home from the University of Wisconsin-Oshkosh to see the show. "It was a really unusual venue for someone like him."

Even now, reminiscences of that remarkable event, posted by the Sheboygan County Historical Research Center, have been trending on social media. Indeed, Neil Diamond nostalgia has resurged nationwide after the Christmas-Day release of "Song

Sung Blue," a movie featuring Hugh Jackman and Kate Hudson as a Wisconsin couple who performed as his tribute band.

But that unforgettable 1970 show in the Plymouth High School auditorium, in front of more than 1,000 fans who had paid between \$3 and \$5 each for tickets, got off to a rough start.


It began a half hour late, the warm-up comedian, Al Brooks (who would later become famous as an actor, director and screenwriter), was a "dismal failure" and the crowd was irritated, restless and downright hostile, according to an article by David Schreiner the next day in the Sheboygan Press.

The Plymouth Review reporter who covered the event - eventual Editor and Publisher Barry Johanson - admitted to even more initial disdain and called Diamond "a scrawny 'top 40' mainstreamer with a fringe commercial sound."

Johanson explained that he had gone to the concert intending to do a photo layout, not write a review. "But the layout wasn't to be," he said. "I'd been stopped at the door and stripped of my camera." (The Sheboygan Press photographer was evidently able to get at least several photos, which are now in the SCHRC archives, but even those are at oddly obscure angles, as if they were taken furtively.)

The indignity of Johanson's camera being confiscated was made worse by the "legions" of Instamatics and Swingers he noticed in the hands of other attendees, and although he conceded that the music was good, he disliked the distraction of the "Jack in the Box audience making photographic popcorn."

According to Ablar, the con-



cert was nonetheless "a phenomenal show and an incredible experience."

Diamond was "outstanding," Ruthann Suhrke Flowers commented on the SCHRC's Facebook post. "He started with lifting up a glass and saying it was the first time he saw an oil slick on a glass of water. Then he sang. Nobody cared about the oil slick comment" after that.

"I was there in the fourth row on the aisle! I loved him then and still do," Jan Van Ess wrote in another comment. "This was the first of five times I saw him in concert. The last time was at the Staples Center in Los Angeles, a slightly bigger venue."

In his article, Schreiner said that although the concert was at first "polished and practiced and very dull," there was suddenly "electricity and magic" once Diamond started involving the audience and cajoled concertgoers to clap along and join him on stage.

"The audience was with him and he was with the audience," Schreiner wrote. "...From that point, the show was on an upswing that never let down."

Diamond's set list included Kentucky Woman, Cherry Cherry, Sweet Caroline, his recently released Holly Holy and the thundering climax, Brother Love's Traveling Salvation Show, not to mention the lesser-known Pot

Smoker's Song and You're So Sweet, Horseflies Keep Buzzing Around Your Face.

"His backup group was led by possibly the best female rock guitarist in the business," Cheryle Sommer noted in another comment on the SCHRC's Facebook post. "Carol Hunter, playing lead, also helped with vocals. Randy Sterling, who Diamond said was best described as resembling a 'very old baby,' played bass, and Eddie Ruben moved it all along on drums."

In the photo on the left, Diamond sits on a bench in what is apparently the humble surroundings of a PHS locker room. Ablar identified Dan Weiland as the

then-PHS senior standing at the left, who interviewed Diamond for Hi-Lights, the school newspaper. A different reporter, also with the lambchop sideburns popular then, records Diamond's remarks.

After the show, autograph-seekers waited for an hour for Diamond to head out to his tour bus and Diamond obliged them before leaving for his next gig in Flint, Michigan.


New volunteers interested in taking part in the survey should first contact their local County

Coordinator for instructions. Sheboygan County Coordinators are Janet and Andy Radatz and can be contacted at aradatz@wi.ir.com. An informational meeting will be held on March 3 rd at Maywood (3615 Mueller Road, Sheboygan) from 6-7 p.m. Information on the crane count can also be found at cranecount.org.

The International Crane Foundation sponsors the Annual Midwest Crane Count to conserve the world's 15 species of cranes and the natural communities on which they depend.

Sandhill Cranes once nearly disappeared from Wisconsin, but the species has successfully recovered and is slowly expanding into neighboring states.

Observations of Sandhill Cranes can lend insight into threatened crane species, including the endangered Whooping Crane. There are now approximately 70 Whooping Cranes in the reintroduced population in central Wisconsin, and crane counters may have a chance of seeing one during the survey.

Although we mainly think of eggnog as a Christmas drink, it doesn't necessarily have to be. Having grown up on a poultry farm, we were often thinking of ways to use up the extra eggs that we didn't sell to customers. My Dad prided himself in making his own eggnog. Later on, after the chickens were gone, we found a recipe for French toast that called for dipping it in

canned eggnog. This became a Christmas brunch tradition for several years. They have since discontinued this product. Instead of purchasing the refrigerated kind, which I find way too heavy on the nutmeg, I made my own. By doing this, you can create this delicious recipe at any time of the year. I love experimenting with cinnamon rolls, there are so many good variations out there. I hope you too will experiment with different recipes till you find your favorite.

Note #1: I have included my recipe for making the eggnog. You however can use the refrigerated kind when it is available.

Note #2: Because of my aversion to nutmeg, I used 1/8 t. nutmeg, and 1/8 t. cinnamon in dough.

Note #3: I made a double batch of frosting because I know that would have been a complaint from my family if I didn't. I used 1 T bourbon and 3 T. eggnog in that double batch. I personally wouldn't want it any stronger, but use your judgement. You can certainly omit the alcohol and use more eggnog or 1/2 + 1/2 in place of it.

Next time I will make a regular powdered sugar frosting instead- I know a lot of people like cream cheese frosting on their cinnamon rolls, and it was good, it's just not MY favorite. I had no complaints when I served these to my family. They are heavy, so 1/2 of a roll may be sufficient, but you can be the judge of that.

Eggnog Cinnamon Rolls

In 2 qt. saucepan on low heat, whisk continuously, so as heat but, not to cook eggs. Heat to 160°:
 3 large eggs
 1 c. 1/2 + 1/2
 2 T. sugar

When warm add:
 1 c. 1/2 + 1/2
 1/2 t. vanilla
 Pinch of cinnamon (or nutmeg)

Pour into container.
 Measure out:
 2 c. eggnog*
 Put in 5 qt. mixer bowl.
 Add:
 6 T. sugar
 1 1/2 t. salt
 1/4 c. butter

Cool to 110°-115°.
 Add:
 1 pkg. (.25 oz.) yeast
 1 large egg

Mix well with beater.
 Add:
 1/4 t. nutmeg*
 6 c. flour

Mix until soft batter forms.
 Put dough hook on, knead on #4 for 5 min.
 Place dough in large, well-greased

bowl. Cover with plastic wrap and let rise in warm place until doubled in bulk, about 1 hour. Don't rush this process.
 Grease 9x13 pan. Set aside.
 Punch down dough, place on counter and roll into a 10"x24" rectangle.
 Melt:
 1/4 c. butter
 Spread on dough.
 Mix:
 1 c. sugar
 2 t. cinnamon

Spread evenly over butter, leaving 1/2" on 1 long side, to allow to seal.
 Roll up starting on long side and pinch seam to seal.
 Using serrated knife, cut into 12 equal pieces. Place them in greased pan. Cover with plastic wrap and allow to rise until doubled in size, about 1 hour. Don't rush.
 Preheat oven to 350°
 When rolls have risen, bake until golden brown about 25 min. Let cool about 5 min. and frost.*
 Mix:
 6 oz. softened cream cheese
 1 1/4 c. powdered sugar
 1 T. bourbon
 1 T. eggnog



Enjoy a taste of tradition easily

Tamales are a traditional Mesoamerican dish made of a masa dough and fillings, and then steamed in a corn husk or banana leaves. While tamales certainly are delicious, the time-consuming nature of making them may compel some to avoid preparing them at home.

This recipe for "Chicken Tamale Pie" offers the flavors of tamales in a single-pan dish. Try it, courtesy of "30-Minute Meal Prep" (Sourcebooks) by Robin Miller.


Chicken Tamale Pie Serves 4

- 1 (8.5-ounce) box corn muffin mix (such as Jiffy)
- 1/3 cup milk
- 2 tablespoons unsalted butter, melted
- 1 large egg
- 2 teaspoons taco seasoning
- 1/2 cup corn, canned, fresh or frozen (thawed if frozen)
- 2 cups shredded, cooked chicken
- 1 cup red enchilada sauce, divided
- 1 cup shredded Monterey Jack cheese, or a blend of cheddar and Jack, or Mexican cheese blend

Fresh cilantro leaves (whole or chopped) for serving

1. Preheat the oven to 400 F. Coat a 9-inch pie plate or oven-safe skillet (such as cast iron) with cooking spray.

2. In a large bowl, whisk together the corn muffin mix, milk, butter, egg, and taco seasoning. Fold in the corn. Transfer the mixture to the prepared pan, and smooth the surface. Bake for 12 to 15 minutes, until a wooden toothpick inserted



near the center comes out clean or with moist bits clinging to it.

3. Meanwhile, in a large skillet or saucepan, combine the chicken and 3/4 cup of the enchilada sauce. Set the pan over medium heat and warm the mixture through.

4. Using the end of a wooden spoon or spatula, poke holes all over the cornbread in the pan. Pour the remaining enchilada sauce into the holes. Top the cornbread with the chicken mixture. Top with the cheese.

5. Bake for 5 minutes, until the cheese melts.

6. Top with fresh cilantro, and serve.



A farm on a hill

The Veg Patch Dispatch

Old Plank Farm is located on a hill just up the road from downtown Plymouth, Wisconsin. When I'm in a romantic mood I might describe it as the farm at the top of the hill overlooking a patchwork quilt of rooftops and church steeples all stitched together by the tree-lined sidewalks of a pleasant

small town. But its place in the world is more practical than picturesque. The top of the hill is defined not by any notable view but instead by the physical phenomenon that allows broken-down vehicles to be pushed out of the driveway, where they roll effortlessly to the bottom of the hill a quarter mile away and still have just enough momentum left to turn into the parking lot of the first business in town, Gritt's Auto Shop.

Which has saved more than one tow. In this way, the farm is at the top of the hill and the town is at the bottom. In every other way, the hilltop in the northwest corner of Plymouth is unpronounced. It is the tail end of town, dotted with modest neighboring houses, closely clipped patches of lawn, and blacktop driveways.

The farm doesn't really seem like it's on a hill, the occasional acquaintance has commented. Which means they have yet to travel to town behind the wheel of a motorized vehicle minus the motor. Our '89 black Ford pick-up truck—which I could

describe as old but then what would that say of me, also an 80's make—has been one such chariot. The driver of the dead truck may contemplate the oddity of the ride long enough to appreciate the ghostly silence in the cab and the contrastingly clumsy pat-a-pat of the bald tires meeting the road below, but not so long as to miss the crucial moment when it's time to crank the dead steering wheel hard left at Gritt's parking lot and take care to land between the lines like a civilized customer. In these moments, the truck is only mostly dead, and the driver is very much alive and in the position to speak with authority on the farm's elevational relationship to town.

The farm isn't any more scenic or even noticeable than the hill on which I plopped myself and my big plans down nearly eighteen years ago. From the road you can't see much besides a small red barn and an old white shed, which may not yet be sagging but are certainly sighing from age. Depending on the time of year, you may also see a smattering of yesteryear trac-

tors and U.F.O.s (Unidentifiable Farm Objects, those common only to vegetable operations or not common at all, if I've recently invented them) parked close to the road. It looks like we're having an auction, crew member Max said when we were angle-parking equipment for winter hibernation last month. *Good grief*, I'd replied, *it's just a little organization*. A cluster of greenhouses is the only real clue that produce is in progress here. The vegetable gardens that are our whole world are set far back from the road and out of sight, and even if they weren't, veggies don't usually jump out at you when you're driving past (which is one reason why I prefer them to, say, pigs).

So you see you could easily drive up the shallow grade out of Plymouth, past my long gravel driveway, and head into the wider world with hardly a glance at this land nor a hint at our lives on it.





Essentials of green growing plants

All growing plants, including those green houseplants, are very efficient systems of specialized tissues and processes that collectively work together with some basic essential inputs.

Green houseplants enhance our indoor winter environments in many ways.



One basic need is soil for roots to grow (excluding hydroponics). Plant roots readily absorb water, aided by microscopic root hairs. When water is available in soil, roots freely allow it to enter. Once inside roots, water travels throughout plants inside xylem tissue, which creates a system of connected hollow tubes networked throughout the plant. Water moves from high to low concentration, so it readily moves from roots to stems to leaves via xylem.

For water to keep moving through plants from high to lower concentration, it needs to exit to lower concentration in leaves. This is done through leaf openings called stomata. As water vapor exits leaves, the drop in concentration draws more water from stems, which then draws more water into stems from roots, and

thus eventually more water enters roots. Water is vital for turgor pressure, which keep plant cells fully expanded. When water is scarce, cells start to collapse and plants wilt. Water is also a key component of photosynthesis and other processes. It also transports available nutrients from the soil.

Chlorophyll, the green pigment in leaves, has the unique ability to transform light energy into chemical energy, starting the process of photosynthesis. Also required is carbon dioxide, entering leaves through stomata. Water, originating from soil, supplies essential hydrogen to the process. The net result of photosynthesis is formation of sugar, providing the energy (food) plants need to grow. Oxygen is a photosynthesis byproduct released through stomata into the air.

Sugar must move from leaves to all areas throughout plants as it fuels living cell processes, better known as respiration. Sugar transport occurs within phloem tissue, located adjacent to xylem and collectively both create

the vascular system. Energy usage is tightly regulated in plants, as they can never burn more than has been stored. This explains why older energy inefficient leaves are often shed from plants. This is also why plants slow down, stop growth, or even go dormant under adverse conditions.

Success with houseplants can be achieved by meeting basic needs to keep these processes running efficiently. Start by selecting plants adapted to their indoor location, especially receiving the proper amount of light. Water and fertilize as needed for the specific plants being grown. Periodically wipe off accumulated dust on leaves to maximize available light intake. Finally, talk closely to your houseplants. They do not care what you say but benefit from the carbon dioxide released as you speak.







A New Kind of Adventure

Hello all,
This is Selina, back again to fill you in on my latest adventures.

As previously mentioned in other columns, I was incredibly fortunate and able to take a month-long trip to New Zealand during December and January.

As my dad always says, I have a lot to tell and not enough room for all of the stories so I will have to be brief.

When I made the tough decision to leave my position as a Biologist with USFWS last year, I decided that I really wanted to do some form of longer-term travel.

When my dad was in his 20s, he spent months hiking the Appalachian Trail and canoeing upstream the Mississippi River; similarly, my mom lived out of a van exploring the American Southwest.

I have been incredibly fortunate to travel the US for work, but had not taken the time to just do something fun for myself and thought this would be the perfect time.

New Zealand was an easy choice, as both mountains and beaches are plenty giving endless opportunities for adventure. English is their primary language, it is very safe to solo travel, and since they are on the opposite side of the globe, their seasons are opposite - meaning I got an extra month of summer

during this (not so harsh) winter. I started and ended my trip in Auckland in the North Island.

My plan for this trip was to rent a car and try to explore as much of the North and South Islands as I could in a short amount of time while tent camping most nights.

Renting a car meant learning to drive on the other side of the road. I was shocked to just be handed a pair of keys to a brand-new vehicle and told to head out.

Once I was out of the city, the driving was not bad, but it was certainly a nerve-wracking start.

I spent eight days exploring the North Island. As one could likely guess given my background, my highlight here was snorkeling Poor Knights Island.

While snorkeling, we saw rays, endless amounts of blue maomao, grouper and wrasse. This was my first time doing any kind of tropical snorkel trip

and absolutely is something I would like to do again.

The North Island has a subtropical climate, and I spent much of my time here relaxing on beaches. Crazy enough, I had to go all the way to New Zealand to experience the Pacific Ocean for the first time.

Another North Island highlight was hiking the Pinnacles Track in the Coromandel National Park and staying overnight in a back country hut. The hut was well equipped to hold 30 people, with bunk beds, a kitchen with an incredibly scenic view, pit toilets, and even a cold shower (which was much needed).

While at the hut, I met travelers from all over the world and made some friends from Germany and England, but was particularly interested in the family groups from New Zealand.

As much as I enjoyed the North Island, I was very excited to ferry south. In the South Island I visited Abel Tasman National

Park, Franz Josef, Punakaiki Pancake Rocks, Wanaka, Queenstown, Milford Sound and Mount Cook/Aoraki.

While all of these experiences were incredible, highlights included a boat tour of Milford Sound and hiking to the Mueller Hut in Mount Cook. While hiking to the Mueller Hut I saw numerous avalanches and was stunned by the closeness of the Sealy Tarns and opal blue alpine lakes that surrounded the summit.

The hike up was a trip, including more than 2,200 steps and 3,500 feet of elevation gain, but the views were more than worth it, and I rewarded myself with a lamb chop up at the summit.

I tried to hold myself to a rather strict budget on this trip and opted to mostly do self-guided hikes rather than tours and extravagant trips.

In total, I hiked just under 100 miles and got 25,000 feet of elevation gain, sustained no inju-

ries and never got lost. To save money, I only ate out a handful of times and enjoyed cooking on a single burner butane stove (mostly from the ground as I refused to buy a table or chair, again to save money.)

I slept in a tent all but three nights, and often only had to pay \$10 for a site.

Additionally, I want to add that at no point during this trip did I feel unsafe. I am aware that it can be dangerous to solo travel, especially as a young woman, however I had nothing but positive experiences interacting with the Kiwi's and other international travelers.

Raise your children, especially your daughters, to be independent and the world is their oyster ...



Spring Exterior Maintenance Projects to Boost Curb Appeal and Protect Your Home

A good professional painter has the right equipment and materials, and knows how to meticulously prep before painting to make the paint job last - scraping to remove loose paint, filling holes, repairing or replacing damaged or rotted wood, sanding, cleaning, applying caulking to weather seal, and applying professional grade exterior primer and finish coat.

2. Don't forget the garage door. Power wash if needed, check for dings or other damage, and look for gaps in weather stripping. Wood, metal (steel and aluminum), and vinyl garage doors can all be painted for a fresh new look. Painting is typically much less expensive than replacing the door, and will provide addi-

tional weather protection.

3. Give your deck some attention so it's ready for relaxing or entertaining. Wood decks need regular maintenance to keep them looking great, particularly moisture sealing. Long term moisture exposure will quickly rot unprotected wood. Composite decks don't require sealing but still need cleaning to banish winter grunge, and most brands don't contain a mold inhibitor. In addition to causing ugly discoloration, mildew or mold can create slippery spots that are a slip hazard. A pro can power wash, sand, prep and reseal or repaint a deck in a fraction of the time it takes most homeowners.


• **Think about toy storage.** Children love to play with toys, and once kids are in



What to know about garage conversions

A need for more space compels many a homeowner to consider home renovations each year. While some homeowners decide to pull up stakes and move after realizing they need more room to maneuver at home, a real estate market marked by low inventory and high prices has made it more affordable for many property owners to stay put and convert existing spaces.

A garage conversion project is one way for homeowners to create more space in their current properties. Homeowners considering such renovations can benefit from a rundown of what a garage conversion entails and what to expect when the project is completed.

• **A new floor will likely be part of the project.** Whether you're converting the garage into a living space or simply hoping to make it look nicer as a workshop or artist's studio, the existing floor will likely need to be replaced. Many garages feature concrete flooring, which cracks easily (homeowners considering a garage renovation may already see cracks in an existing floor). When converting

a garage, renovation experts will undoubtedly advise replacing the existing floor, and some will recommend polyaspartic floor installation. Various garage conversion experts note that polyaspartic flooring is ideal for garage spaces because it's durable, resistant to damage that can be caused by chemicals and offers much more aesthetic appeal than a concrete floor.

• **The room will need ventilation and heating and cooling.** A garage used for traditional purposes (i.e., parking cars, storing lawn and garden tools, etc.) likely will not be connected to a home's existing HVAC system and may not feature a window that can be opened or closed to allow for fresh air to enter the space. The space will need ventilation and heating and cooling capabilities if it's being converted.

• **Location and climate bear consideration.** Before going forward with a garage conversion, homeowners should consider where they live and the local climate. Homeowners living in urban areas where parking is at a premium may be doing

themselves (and future owners) a disservice by converting a space where they can presently park a vehicle into something else. In addition, people living in locales where outdoor activities like surfing, kayaking and cycling are popular will have to determine where items necessary for such activities will be stored if they decide to convert their garages into living spaces. Of course, garage renovation teams can incorporate storage into a design, so homeowners should not hesitate to discuss their lifestyle with contractors to ensure the room accommodates their hobbies after the conversion is complete.

• **Zoning laws may or may not affect the project.** Laws vary depending on where homeowners live, so it's impossible to say with certainty if homeowners will or won't run into zoning issues during a project. However, the design of the finished product may offer hints as to any permit-related hurdles homeowners may need to clear. For example, if the garage doors are



Items in cluttered bathrooms can easily end up on the floor, and that goes for bathing items like shampoo and soap as well. A bathroom storage system for a vanity and an organizer for bathing items inside a shower or tub can decrease the chance that items end up on the floor, where they can pose an injury risk for seniors who might

struggle to bend over to pick them up or slip on fallen items when bathing.

• Renovate your existing shower. Seniors whose current bathrooms house a traditional shower setup that requires them to step over a tub can renovate the space and replace that feature with a walk-in shower. A walk-in shower does not require seniors step over a bathtub, greatly reducing the risk of falls while bathing. Some additional shower renovations include installing a bench so seniors can sit down while bathing, ideally while using a hand-held shower head.

• Purchase non-slip materials for the bathroom. Non-slip

floor mats in a bathroom are essential for anyone, and especially beneficial for seniors. A non-slip vanity storage bin and toothbrush holder also can ensure daily accessories remain accessible.

• Elevate toilet heights. Elevating toilet heights in bathrooms throughout the home can make it easier for seniors to sit down and get up when going to the bathroom. Toilets compliant with the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) are roughly 18 inches taller than standard toilets, which can make a big difference for seniors.
