Local gift shop creates space for craft vendors to display talents

Jackee Kaiser was getting “sick of running around.” The Sheboygan native who lives in Plymouth was going to weekend craft shows at least twice a month, if not more, and sometimes drove as far as two-plus hours to sell her things. So two years ago (May 25 is the anniversary), Kaiser opened 3 Elephants & Company at 539 South Taylor Drive in Sheboy-

gan. It offers open space for local artists, creators and makers to sell their items. “We didn’t have anything here that supported small businesses,” she said. “I mean, we’ve got Walmart and all those other places that support the big guy, but you didn’t have anybody that supported the little guy.” In the beginning, there were 35 vendors in a 300-square-foot store. Now? “I never thought I’d be in a 3,000-square-foot space with as

much talent (78 vendors) that there is,” Kaiser said. “I knew there was talent in the county, but I did not realize how much talent, and how different everybody’s thoughts and ideas were to create such a large array of items.” Seventy-two vendors are from the county, with others from the Milwaukee and Appleton/Green Bay areas. “This is really keeping our actual economy going in the county,” Kaiser said. 3 Elephants & Company offers items like deviled egg holders and wall décor that reads “Spoiled dogs and their household staff live here.” Dehydrated dog treats are a big hit, and there’s plenty of local- and state-related items. Kaiser is also pushing for more customization of things, like cutting boards that can be lasered with personalization of last names. A vendor is coming to do self-3D portraits on custom wood. “Which has been my goal from the beginning, to be that go-to place ... for stuff you can’t find anywhere else,” she said. 3 Elephants & Company also

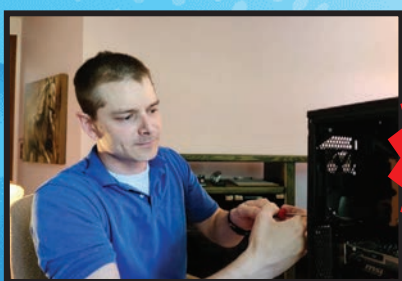

Sheboygan house fire leaves one person and dog dead

Press release from the City of Sheboygan Fire Department - May 11

On May 11th at 12:03 a.m., the Sheboygan Fire Department Dispatch Center received a report of a possible structure fire on Pershing Avenue on the City's north side called in by a passer-by, noting they saw smoke and heard smoke alarms sounding. A full department response was dispatched.

First arriving companies encountered a residential structure with moderate smoke showing from the eaves and chimney area. Crews forced entry and found heavy smoke banked down to the floor. Firefighters advanced interior hose lines and located moderate fire

conditions in the kitchen and stairway area.

While searching the residence, crews located one deceased occupant inside the residence. During the secondary search, firefighters also located a deceased dog.

Crews encountered multiple interior and exterior obstacles while operating on scene but were able to quickly control and extinguish the fire within minutes. The cause of the fire remains under investigation.

Public Safety Message

The Sheboygan Fire Department reminds residents to install smoke alarms on every level of the home. Smoke alarms should be tested monthly, and batteries should be replaced at least annually.

Plans for Sheboygan Memorial Day celebration underway

Planning is underway for the annual City of Sheboygan Memorial Day celebration, set for Monday, May 25, with a parade, ceremony and brat fry in downtown Sheboygan.

The event is a collaboration between United States veterans and active-duty personnel, the City of Sheboygan, the Sheboygan County Veterans Service Office and Launch: Lakeland Student-Run Businesses. Köhler Credit Union is sponsoring the parade.

The parade will be held in downtown Sheboygan starting at 9 a.m. with a ceremony to follow at Fountain Park.

The parade route starts at 7th Street & Center Avenue, goes north on 7th Street to Michigan Avenue, goes west on Michi-

gan to 9th Street, goes south on 9th Street and ends at Fountain Park.

The Memorial Day ceremony begins immediately after the parade at Fountain Park and will include a remembrance of those who gave their lives in service to our nation, as well as a tribute to veterans and active-duty men and women.

This year's featured speaker is Craig Stewart, who serves as the county veterans service officer for Sheboygan County. He works directly with veterans and their families to ensure they receive the benefits and support they have earned through service.

In Major League Baseball, the average for a triple play is one for every 500-600 games played - which is rarer than a no-hitter.

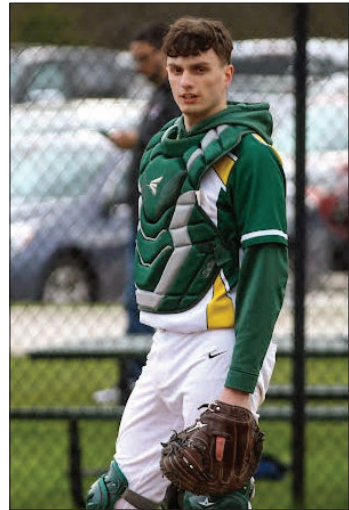
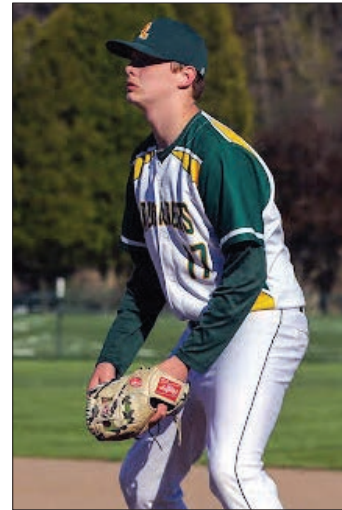
Shortstop Keagan Fay (right) picked up a grounder and tagged second base.

North's Lee reminds his coach of someone

Elijah Lee reminds North tennis coach Mike Vorpahl of someone.

"He's one of those guys, he's just like a plumber," Vorpahl said. "He fills all the places you need help, you know? He plugs the leaks, so to speak."

However, some plumbers - or high school athletes - aren't always easy to get along with.

"Yeah, he's just a very nice kid," the coach added. "He really is. He's a great kid. When I call him an early and late guy, he comes early, he stays late. He has a beautiful mindset on the court. He wants to win, but not at all costs. I mean, it's not like he's not going to cheat or anything. He plays so hard, but he's always a gentleman on the court. Whether he wins or loses, he walks up there and shakes hands. And his demeanor after the match is as if you don't know if he won or lost."

"He's a great guy. You never have to worry about his behav-

ior, and his emotions are always in check."

No wonder Lee is one of three captains for the Golden Raiders this season.

Vorpahl also gives him high praise for being the role model that he is.

"He puts the team first," he said. "When I asked guys what they preferred, singles or doubles, he made it perfectly clear to me in front of the group - and just one on one - he'll play whatever makes the team better. Whatever I think makes the team better. So if you want him to play singles, he'll play singles. If you want him to play doubles, he'll play doubles."

Lee, for the first time, is playing doubles this year and is partnered with Colby Smith at the No. 1 flight.

His first three varsity seasons, he played singles.

"When I switched over to doubles, I'm actually enjoying it

a lot more because I just feel like it's more fun and not as stressful," Lee said.

Vorpahl, who returned to coaching North last season and is in his 34th year overall, was also impressed with how Lee started

a chat/text group for the Golden Raiders.

"He's been a real good, shall we say, intermediary between the coach and the players," Vorpahl said. "With spring sports, we are constantly having rain-

outs and rescheduling and telling kids don't forget to bring this and don't forget to bring that.

"Like for the tennis banquet coming up, reminding the guys they've got to get their forms into the right people. He's always able to help get information out, because information is constantly changing. A great example: our match against De Pere that's coming up has been scheduled on three different days. So he constantly helps me communicate with players and parents what's going on because of spring and the weather and all kinds of other demands."

Lee was told of the compliments by his coach and asked how he felt about it.

"I find it kind of inspiring, myself, that I get other people to look up to me," he said. "Just hearing words from other people saying I do, inspires me more to be who I am and continue what I do, so I can inspire others."

A: One thing I want is getting As on my finals.

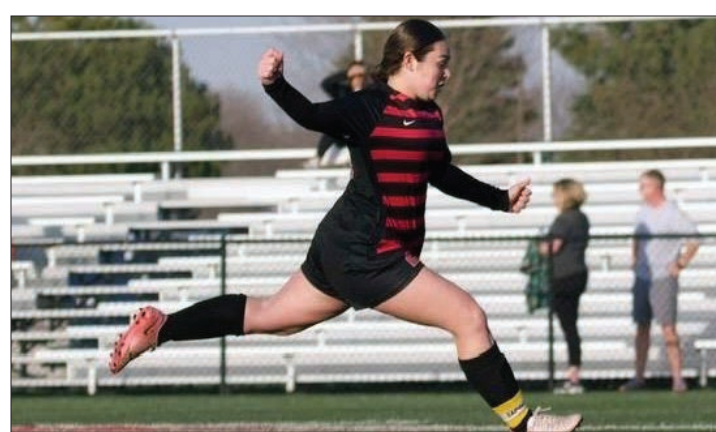
Q: What's a high school story you'll be talking about 25 years from now?

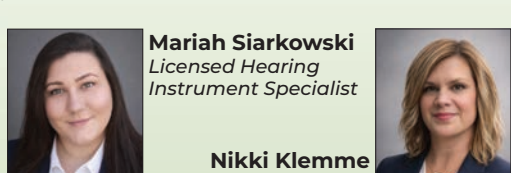

Some of my favorite memories of my Mom are coming home to fresh-baked cookies. My earliest childhood memories are of me sitting on the Costco stool helping Mom make supper and counting down the minutes till my Dad would get home to eat with us.

I am drawn to the TV shows that depict families still sitting down for a meal together where phones are only allowed for job emergencies. Food is a great connection to get people to talk, maybe these cookies will open up a dialog for you and your young ones about their day.

Note #1: The recipe didn't call for the chips added- I just wanted to take it up a notch.

Note #2: I used 2 t. of each flavor dough- it made about a 2 1/2" cookie. I got 40 swirl cookies and 3 that were just peanut butter.

Note #3: I put 8 cookies on a pan. 3-2-3

Note #4: Even though I prefer a crunch dunking cookie usually- these are meant to be soft in the center- and I think they are much better that way- I tried a pan crunchy and a pan soft- and the soft in the center are MUCH better for this recipe!

Note #5: These freeze very well! I will be making another batch and divide them into bags of 6 so we can just pop one or two out as we need them- I like to have something on hand in case we get unexpected company.

Chocolate & Peanut butter Swirl cookies

P.B. cookie dough
Beat:
1/2 c. butter
1/2 c. creamy peanut butter
1/2 c. brown sugar
1/4 c. white sugar

Add:
1 egg
1 t. vanilla

Stir in:
1 1/4 c. flour
1/2 t. baking soda
1/4 t. salt
*1 c. peanut butter chips

Chocolate cookie dough
Beat:
1/2 c. butter
1/2 c. brown sugar
1/2 c. white sugar

Add:
1 egg
1 t. vanilla

Stir in:
1 c. flour
1/3 c. cocoa
1/2 t. baking soda
1/4 t. salt
*1c. semi-sweet chocolate chips

Preheat oven to 350°. Scoop equal amounts of each dough* and flatten together one on top of the other. Roll into a ball. And place on a parchment lined cookie sheet. Leave 2" between balls.* Bake 10 min. or until edges are set and centers are soft* Note: They will look a little raw in oven, but take out- or they will get too crunchy.

A Look Back... on local homecoming celebrations over 100 years ago

Massive municipal homecoming celebrations had become a trend as the first decade of the 1900s and the industrial revolution progressed. Not to be outdone, Sheboygan was all through late 1908 and early 1909 preparing for what prom-

ised to be its most spectacular such festival ever. Scores of local volunteers involved in the planning were eager to showcase the city and striving to surpass similar events elsewhere.

"Every energetic city has had a homecoming festival and prospered by it, not only financially, but industrially as well. Therefore, all those who

are interested in the welfare of our beautiful city in the future, ought to take part and help the

cause along," a November 27, 1908 Sheboygan Press article exhorted readers.

Sheboygan's celebration

would span six days from Monday, August 9 through Saturday, August 14, 1909 and feature receptions and reunions, concerts, performances, drills and demonstrations, a carnival, ball games and all manner of pageantry, according to detailed daily schedules in the Sheboygan Telegram and Press. Green and white were the official event colors and a 74-page souvenir book was published.

Two of the several parades planned were especially elabo-

rate and over the top: an industrial parade promoting "the City of Cheese, Chairs and Children" and a floral procession with abundant mums, poppies, roses, sunflowers, hollyhocks and other blooms decorating automobiles (which were all by themselves an exciting new attraction), horses, carriages and bicycles.

Former Sheboygan mayor Frank Geele - then the owner of a large hardware store founded in 1850 by his father, Francis, who had been a six-term mayor himself - was at the center of all the hoopla. The F. Geele

Hardware Company and Store, a downtown icon, would remain in continuous operation for a total of more than 100 years, until 1956. As chairman of the homecoming festival's housing committee, Frank Geele was in charge of arranging lodging for the thousands of visitors expected.

It is clear from the photo on page 12 of his float in the industrial parade that he was not about to miss the opportunity to advertise his store's shiny new stoves and other hardware, either. This image was shared by the late, local historian Scott Lewandoski in a 2016 Facebook post after he had seen it on a postcard advertised for sale, although it is not in his or other collections at the Sheboygan County Museum and Sheboygan County Historical Research Center.

An almost identical photo appeared with a May 9, 1950 Sheboygan Press story marking the hardware store's centennial, however, and offers a glimpse of the enormous bunting draped across the entire second story of the hardware store that day. Geele himself was said to be standing among the crowds on the sidewalk, observing.

Just before homecoming week, an article in the Sheboygan Telegram noted that "thousands of yards of green and white bunting have been ordered and if plans are carried out, the city will appear as one

large, continuous wave of bunting and flags. Electric signs are being ordered to be placed in front of many business places. Five hundred electric lights will illuminate Fountain Park and transform night into day."

Geele Hardware actually had two of the 89 units in the industrial parade, which was a mile and a half long. While one Geele float featured stoves, the other one displayed furnaces. Downpours prevented the parade from occurring as scheduled that Wednesday afternoon, so it was postponed to 10:30 a.m. that Thursday, and the sun came out just as it began. An estimated 15,000 spectators lined the streets.

Floats were wildly inventive and local newspapers offered descriptions of every one. Some carried huge machines, engines and equipment, while others ferried festively dressed women and children or workers demonstrating tasks. Many businesses opted for a patriotic red, white and blue or other color scheme rather than the regulation green and white, so color was everywhere.

One of Gutsch Brewing Company's two entries consisted of an open bottle wagon converted into a cage for "wild animals," which were actually three mastiffs, with a "hobo band" playing above them. But real camels and elephants were in the parade as well.

The Arthur Imig Store's float

carried a giant flying machine model, while the J.J. Vollrath Manufacturing wagon bore the company's famous "world's largest teapot" from the 1893 World Fair.

The Sheboygan Light, Power and Railway Company had no fewer than six floats, each demonstrating a different use of electricity. Kohlberg Laundry's entry featured a group of little children washing clothes in a tub and ironing as they rode along.

"Homecomings have been held in this and in other states, but it is safe to say that at no such gathering have manufacturers and merchants made such a pleasing showing as that of this morning," the August 12, 1909 Sheboygan Press boasted.

That same day at 2 p.m., the floral parade with 90 entries - including 25 cars, nine electric "runabouts" and other forms of conveyance, all festooned with flowers - commenced. It was said to be a mile long.

According to an August 7, 1909 announcement in the Sheboygan Telegram, "one of the odd features of the parade will be Gonzenbach's tame, trained electric automobiles. About eight or ten of these will be in line and they have been training every night this week to the sound of a bugle. These automobiles will go through their

evolutions at the notes of military calls and will present a very pretty spectacle expected to be the sensation of the parade.”

The Telegram later noted that a young Carl Vollrath and his bride, with guests from Chicago

riding along, whizzed ahead of the floral procession “in a ninety horse power race automobile, the machine shining in a new coat of green paint.”

Another Telegram article gushed afterwards that the parade converted the streets “into a veritable flower garden” and stated that “it is indeed a cred-

it to the city when there were three times as many equipments as there were in the Milwaukee floral parade.”

“Nothing so beautiful has ever been witnessed in Sheboygan,” a reflection in the Press claimed.

Other surprises unfolded throughout the week. For ex-

ample, just as a “run” of firemen racing through downtown streets started, a multitude of church bells and factory and tug boat whistles went off at the same time. The crowds were further wowed when Roman candles were suddenly shot

from fire engines, equipment in the firefighters’ hands and fixed spots along the route, and started exploding all around them.

The 1909 homecoming celebration was deemed a triumph and Sheboygan had done itself proud.

Spice up dinnertime with a Cajun classic

Experimenting in the kitchen is one of the joys of cooking. Trying new recipes or even going off-script and tinkering with an existing recipe based on your own hunch can open eyes and treat taste buds to new flavor profiles.

Home cooks who want to expand their culinary repertoires with some particularly notable flavor can look to Cajun food and its distinct dishes to accomplish that goal. If that sounds like an exciting night in the kitchen, try this recipe for "Jambalaya With Sausage and Shrimp" from Lines+Angles.

Jambalaya With Sausage and Shrimp Makes 4 servings

- 1 tablespoon vegetable oil
- 8 ounces chorizo or andouille sausage, sliced into 1/4-inch rounds
- 1 lb. large raw shell-on shrimp
- 1 onion, peeled and finely chopped
- 1 rib of celery, rinsed, trimmed and finely chopped
- 1 small red bell pepper, rinsed, trimmed, seeded, and diced
- 1 small green bell pepper, rinsed, trimmed, seeded, and diced
- 4 cloves of garlic, peeled and minced
- 1 1/2 cups long grain white rice, rinsed
- 2 tablespoons tomato paste
- 1 teaspoon salt

- 1 teaspoon fresh thyme leaves, minced
- 14 ounces canned diced tomatoes, drained, juice reserved
- 4 cups clam juice
- 1 bay leaf
- Fresh parsley, rinsed and chopped (for garnish)

1. Preheat oven to 325 F. Adjust oven rack to middle position.

2. In a deep cast iron skillet or Dutch oven, set over medium-high heat, heat oil until shimmering, but not smoking. Add sausage and cook for 3 to 5 minutes, or until browned. Remove sausage from pan using a slotted spoon and drain on paper towels. Add shrimp to the pan and cook until the shells are browned on both sides, about 1 minute per side. Transfer shrimp to a large bowl and refrigerate.

3. Add onion, celery, peppers, and garlic to the pan. Reduce heat to medium, and cook, stirring frequently, until vegetables have softened, about 7 to 10 minutes. Add rice, tomato paste, salt, and thyme; cook until rice is completely coated with oil, about 2 minutes.

4. Stir in the tomatoes, 1/4 cup reserved tomato juice, clam juice, bay leaf, and sausage. Place a piece of aluminum foil directly on rice. Bring to a boil, cover pan, transfer to oven and bake for about 18 to 20 minutes, or until



the rice is almost tender and most of the liquid is absorbed.

5. Meanwhile, remove the shrimp from the refrigerator; peel and clean, discarding the shells. Remove pan from oven, uncover and remove aluminum foil. Gently stir in the peeled shrimp. Lay the foil back down over the surface of the rice and cover with lid, return to oven, and cook until the rice is tender, all the liquid is absorbed and the shrimp is cooked through, about 5 minutes.

6. Remove pan from oven, uncover, remove foil and bay leaf. Sprinkle with chopped parsley. Divide between bowls. Serve.

Slow Motion Manifesto

I was last seen here working at heart attack pace, which is what we call the planting situation where we sit on a wagon and our hands race to put vegetable transplants into the ground while keeping pace with a moving tractor, at a rate of thousands of plants per hour. That pace is mostly a taste of the past (excuse me a minute while I go knock on wood); it's a glimpse of life at Old Plank Farm when the

planting wagon was a new creation and reality was routinely getting in the way of my best inventions. These days, we ride on version 7.0 of our planting wagon, and it is the latest and greatest in bizarre bundles of scrap wood, wheel barrow parts, and black pipe all hitched to a rusty wagon and towed by a fifty year old tractor.

Aesthetics aside, the current model is practically airplane grade travel, at altitudes of three inches above ground. It includes upgraded seats with more legroom, linkable seats so multiple people can sit in a line and work together on one row (captains and co-pilots), and the life-saving flight attendant who makes our work fly by, even if that person hasn't yet figured out how to provide fresh baked cookies on the thirty minute trip across the field.

But I'm getting ahead of myself. Before the structural and personnel improvements were made to our planting system, we had to make due with innovative bodily contortions and refined mental states to get us through heart attack pace. The most notable was crew member Angelica's

idea of working in slow motion.

Slow motion?! I wailed when Angelica first suggested the idea from her side of the planting wagon, as the tractor chugged forward at a pace unsympathetic to my distress signals. I was flapping around like a beached seal frantically slapping plants into the ground. Slow motion sounded like the exact opposite of what I needed to do. It certainly was the exact opposite of what I was doing, which was fumbling for plants, hurrying to catch up but falling further and further behind.

Yeah, she said, try working in slow motion. So I reset my mind, slowed my breathing, focused the motion of my hands to a deliberate, controlled pattern, and steadily moved one plant at a time from my tray to the holes in the soil in front of me. And it worked. Within seconds I had caught back up. That's amazing, I told her, trying to keep the rhythm, which was anything but slow, yet worked only by holding onto the idea of slow.

Those out-of-control, thoughtless rushing actions that are habitual under pressure can be counteracted by a deliberate relaxing of mind and movement. It's a fascinating life skill to practice, and there's no better place than on our planting wagon, where it's all too easy to slip into a frenzied state of being, but just as easy to get immediate results from meditating on the slow motion manifesto.

Back to the present era, circa last week, where planting is now a bit more book club-ish and less torture device-ish, especially since we added a flight attendant to our planting roster. He doesn't plant and he doesn't drive the tractor, which may make him sound superfluous, but in fact our top flight attendant is worth his weight in gold (but don't tell him that; his paychecks don't quite reflect as much). He keeps everything running smoothly by handing the planting crew new trays of plants, adjusting the water lines, and walking back and forth to communicate between planters and the tractor driver. We used to scream stop! stop! Sto-o-o-o-P! at the top of our lungs to get the driver to hear our plea over the roar of the diesel engine. And that just wasn't very neighborly, what with our field being right in town.

As for the in-flight, fresh baked cookies, that's in the works for version 8.0. All I need is my portable power inverter, an easy-bake oven, and a gullible new flight attendant to join the ranks.

There's another story about Wisconsin agriculture buzzing just beneath the surface. It's the story of honey, of pollinators, and of the small but powerful role bees play in feeding our state and our world.

Wisconsin's honey industry may be modest in size, but it carries meaningful impact. In 2024, Wisconsin beekeepers produced approximately 2.51 million pounds of honey from about 57,000 colonies, contributing an estimated \$8.85 million to the state's agricultural economy. These numbers reflect the dedication of hundreds of beekeepers, many of whom are members of the Wisconsin Honey Producers Association, who take care of their hives through changing seasons, weather patterns, and ongoing challenges.

The Wisconsin Honey Producers Association plays a vital role

in supporting this community, offering education, advocacy, and opportunities for beekeepers of all experience levels, from hobbyists to commercial operators. Their work, alongside partners like the Wisconsin Department of Agriculture, Trade and Consumer Protection (DATCP) ensures that beekeeping remains a strong and supported part of our state's agricultural landscape.

But honey is only part of the story.

Bees are essential pollinators, and their impact reaches far beyond the hive. Wisconsin ranks among the nation's leaders in crops like cranberries, apples, and specialty fruits—all of which depend heavily on pollination. In fact, honey bees and other pollinators are critical to the production of many of the foods we enjoy every day. Without them, yields would decline, food systems would shift, and the diversity of crops that define Wisconsin's \$116.3 billion agri-

culture industry would be at risk.

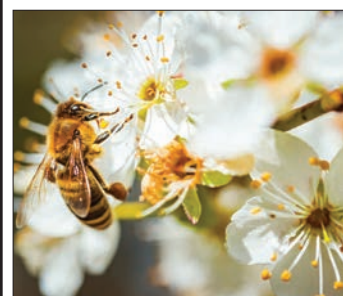
That's why DATCP invests in protecting pollinator health through its Apiary Program, supporting beekeepers with inspections, disease monitoring, and education. The agency also leads the state's Pollinator Protection Plan, encouraging farmers, homeowners, and communities to take simple but meaningful steps to support pollinators. These efforts emphasize that when we care for pol-

linators, we care for agriculture as a whole.

However, challenges to Wisconsin's honey industry remain. Weather variability, habitat loss, and pests like Varroa mites continue to impact honey production and hive health. Even so, Wisconsin consistently ranks among the top honey-producing states, producing nearly 3 million pounds annually in recent years and maintaining a strong presence in the national market.

As I travel across Wisconsin, I'm inspired by the collaboration I see to sustain Wisconsin's honey industry, between farmers planting pollinator-friendly cover crops, beekeepers managing healthy hives, and consumers choosing local honey. I invite you all to support Wisconsin honey producers, plant flowers that nourish pollinators, and take time to learn where your food comes from. Whether it's a backyard garden or a local farmers market, your choices matter.

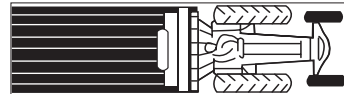

Want to refinish a piece of wood furniture? Pros at Schwaller's Painting share some important things to consider.

Know what you're getting into.

It's easy to get excited about transforming an old furniture piece when you see it done in a social media video in less than a minute. The reality is that refinishing furniture is a time-consuming, messy job that requires multiple steps, products and equipment you will need to buy, and a well-ventilated space to work on your project for several days.

Before you start, assess what you can realistically do with the piece.

Antique or vintage furniture can be a stylish addition to your home, but old wood furniture isn't always in the best condition. Before you commit, inspect the piece carefully for insects, damaged wood, failing joints, and broken hardware. Dam-

age doesn't have to be a deal breaker, but it will likely affect your options to restore it. If you don't have woodworking experience, consider passing on a piece with structural damage and look for furniture that just needs to be refinished.

Do I need to strip the finish first?

If you want a stained wood finish, you will need to remove the current varnish or paint using a chemical stripper, which is a messy job with noxious fumes. Furniture with a lot of carved details or leg turnings will take a lot more time to strip than a piece with very simple lines. After stripping the piece will need to be cleaned, any wood damage repaired, sanded thoroughly, and cleaned again before staining. If you are painting the piece, you may be able to skip the stripping and sand it thoroughly, then apply the

correct primer before painting and finishing with a sealer.

Is DIY the best option for this project?

If you want a really smooth, durable finish that will last for years, consider having it professionally refinished. It may not be cost effective for every furniture upcycling project, but it's well worth it for a more expensive furniture piece or one with a lot of sentimental value to restore it like new.

Managing moss problems in lawns

As lawns green-up and resume growing across Wisconsin this spring, some areas may have more moss than grass. There are several reasons why this occurs, as moss is not an aggressive plant like some other weeds that may invade lawns. Correcting the cause of lawn decline that leads to moss development is the key to solving moss problems.

Two common underlying causes typically attributed to moss issues on lawns are shade and acidic soil. Shade is usually a major factor, as lawns commonly decline in these areas allowing the moss to develop. Acidic soil can be another reason, although not as common as often thought. Unfavorable soil pH, both acidic and alkaline, along with low overall fertility may be involved.

Poor drainage and soil compaction are also common issues causing lawns to struggle, but conditions that are tolerated by moss.

Carefully assessing all these factors and conditions occurring on the specific site where moss has become an issue is necessary before taking steps to solve the problem. A soil test is an ideal starting point, as soil test results provide a soil pH value. Despite what is sometimes written or shown on gardening videos, do not assume moss is always growing on acidic soil. Always refer to soil test results. If acidic, limestone can be used to raise the pH and if alkaline, sulfur will lower the pH. How much to add of either one is based on the actual soil pH determined via soil testing.

Fine fescues are the best choice for lawns in shade. These include chewings, creeping red, sheep, and hard fescues. These are the primary components of commercially available shade lawn seed products. Two significant lawn care adjustments for shade lawns are fertilizing less and mowing taller. Apply half as much nitrogen in shade as compared to full-sun lawns over the course of the season. Excess nitrogen can

lead to decline of lawns in shade. While a mowing height of three inches or higher is recommended on most lawns, it is especially important in shady areas.

Surface drainage and soil compaction issues, which contribute to lawn decline and moss development, can be corrected by core aerating. Core aerators that pull up cores and drop them on the soil surface are best. Consider aerating in spring or fall. Core aerating is also beneficial for tree root systems, so this practice can be done under trees.

Finally, another consideration in managing chronic moss and poor condition shade lawns could be converting problem areas into another type of planting. There are numerous shade tolerant ground covers or other shade loving plants to investigate as potential alternatives to lawns.

Prepare a yard for evening entertaining

Even when the sun goes down, the opportunity to entertain outdoors is still possible. Transforming a backyard into an evening oasis does not necessarily require major renovations, but it should involve adjusting the atmosphere to facilitate comfort and visibility. The following tips can help hosts optimize outdoor spaces for nighttime events.

Layered lighting

Lighting is the main priority when hosting at night. Lighting establishes ambiance and creates safety in the space. Hosts should avoid floodlights which can be too harsh and create a clinical feeling. Instead, melding differ-

ent lighting options together can set the scene. String lights provide a warm, even glow that can outline the perimeter and "ceiling" of an outdoor room. Low-voltage LEDs or solar lights can make walkways more visible and call attention to changes in elevation. Accent lighting, such as small spotlights uplighting trees or architectural features, will create depth and keep the yard from feeling like an abyss beyond the patio or deck.

Create focal points

Individuals will gather around various focal points in the yard. These established zones will encourage conversation and other

activities. A fire pit is a natural magnet for outdoor events. Arrange seating around the fire pit to keep conversation flowing. An outdoor bar also is a great place for people to gather, whether it's stocked with alcoholic or non-alcoholic drinks. Mark off an area where people can mingle and dance. Set up an outdoor speaker in this area.

Outdoor comfort

Contending with bugs and weather is a natural side effect of spending time outdoors, particularly in the evening. Citronella candles can keep mosquitoes and gnats at bay. A simple electric floor fan also can be effective against mosquitoes, which are weak fliers that can't fly against the breeze. A fire pit, propane patio heater and a basket of blankets can help tame the chills if the temperature drops. Keeping pop-up canopies at the ready will help if rain starts to fall.

Accessibility to food and drink

Beyond the bar, having self-service stations in various spots enables guests to grab food or drink as needed instead of having to trek indoors. Make sure these spots are well-lit. Space drinks away from the food to prevent traffic jams. Invest in some covered containers that will keep food safe from ants or flying insects and trays to easily transport glassware and other items back into the house.

A yard can be a magical place to entertain at night when hosts take a few extra steps to ready the space.

Choosing the best foods for backyard birds

Feeding wild birds can be a popular and rewarding hobby. Such a hobby facilitates a connection with nature and helps to ensure local wildlife gets the sustenance it needs to survive.

According to estimates from the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, around 50 million Americans engage in bird feeding each year. When feeding birds, it's important to choose quality foods to ensure health and survival, particularly during months when the weather is harsh. Here are some factors to consider when setting out food for birds.

Choose wisely

When selecting bird feed, homeowners should look for feed that is high in fat and protein. Black oil sunflower seeds (BOSS) are a popular choice because they offer high caloric value and are easily opened by the greatest variety of species. The Cornell Lab of Ornithology reports that BOSS, which are small, thin-shelled seeds, attract more than 40 types of North American birds, making it the most universally accepted food.

For smaller birds, like goldfinches and pine siskins, nyjer (thistle) seed is an ideal choice.

Offer essential fats

It's key for birds in colder climates to maintain significant fat reserves to achieve the correct body temperature. Suet cakes, which are rendered beef fat mixed

with seeds or fruit, can be the meal birds need. Suet provides essential calories for birds like woodpeckers, nuthatches and chickadees when insects are scarce. Homeowners should choose commercially produced suet cakes or raw suet, as homemade varieties made from cooking grease might melt and mat birds' feathers, affecting their insulation.

Shelled peanuts and crushed nut meats, which are the kernel of nuts, can offer high-energy fats for titmice and jays.

Avoid certain foods

Although we've all seen people casting bread out to wild birds, bread products are particularly discouraged as bird food. They fill birds' stomachs without providing necessary nutrients. Table scraps containing excessive salt or sugar also should be avoided.

Maintain avian hygiene

Bird feeders can concentrate

flocks, which can be fun to watch. But it also increases the risk of disease transmission among birds. The Audubon Society and similar conservation groups emphasize that studies show poor feeder hygiene can increase rates of disease like salmonellosis. Feeders should be cleaned weekly with a mild bleach solution (one part bleach to nine parts water) and completely dried before refilling. Hosing off the area to wash away bird droppings also can keep feeders and surrounding areas sanitary.

Choosing nutrient-dense, high-quality seeds and fats and maintaining a clean feeding station can ensure that a backyard remains a haven for wild birds. Those with additional questions about what to feed birds should consult with a wild bird food retailer.
